It had to happen sooner or later, of course. A United Press dispatch reveals that a man in Pheonix, Arizona, saved his own life by making a contribution to the Red Cross blood center

It seems that Albert A. Davis, who, on May 16, 1949, made his fifth donation of rare negative-O type blood was critically injured in an automobile accident the next day. Doctors at the hospital believed there was only one chance in a thousand that they could obtain the right kind of blood to save him, but called the Red Cross center anyway. 
