Bellevue to Seek Bridge Over Missouri

Application has been made by the city of Bellevue for the construction of a highway bridge over the Missouri river at that place, spanning the stream between the Sarpy county city and Iowa.

The hearing has been set for August 21, 1950 and objections, facts and arguments may be submitted to the office of the district engineer, corps of engineers, U. S. Army, 1709 Jackson street, Omaha, any time up to that date.

The plans submitted by the applicant show the bridge will consist of two (2) continuous cantilever through-truss spans, built with the point of intersection over the center pier over all length 840 feet; four (4) 150-foot steel deck spans, over all length 600 feet, built on a 5% down grade, from the right (Nebraska) bank approach; the left

(Iowa) bank approach, built on a 5% down grade, consists of two (2) 150-foot and three (3) 70-foot steel deck spans, over all length 510 feet. The total length of the bridge between abutments is 1,950 feet. The vertical clearance of the two cantilever spans at the end piers is 52.5 feet above Standard High Water elevation of 962.7 feet. The right span is the main navigation span. The riverward face of the right bank pier will be placed at the stabilized channel line, and will provide a horizontal clearance of 400 feet between the stabilized channel line and the middle pier. The left span will have a horizontal clearance of 260 feet between the east face of the center pier and the left (Iowa) bank stabilized channel line. All elevations refer to Mean Sea Level
