Reminders for veterans planning to attend school this fall under the GI bill were issued Thursday by Ashley Westmoreland, Lincoln regional office manager.

The reminders: 1. Veterans planning to continue the same course at school need not contact the VA, but make certain the school has room for them. 2. Those continuing in the same course, but a different school, should obtain a supplemental certificate of eligibility from the VA. 3. Veterans changing a course of study from one field to another for the first time, may do so by applying to the VA for a supplemental certificate of eligibility. Same applies to those who have discontinued or completed the GI bill training and wish to make a first change to a different general field. 4. Those who have changed courses of study once and wish to do so again, should apply to the VA for advisement and guidance. The agency will determine through this whether the veteran has need for the new course and the aptitude necessary to complete it. Under the law, automatic approval comes if the VA doesn't arrive at a decision within 45 days after application. The veteran, however, must appear at the appointed time for advisement and must have cooperated. 5. Veterans planning to start training this fall for the first time, should apply to the nearest VA office for an original certificate of eligibility. Name of school and course must be included, together with a photostatic copy of discharge papers. The Lincoln regional office is at Twelfth and O streets, Lincoln. 6. July 25, 1951, is the cut-off date for starting training for all


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
