CONSTRUCTING NEW DRIVEWAY CRIB

Construction of a new driveway crib got underway this week on the farm of George H. Reike 3 1/2 miles south of Murray Corner.

The new 5,300-bushel crib will be constructed of ventilated concrete blocks reinforced with heavy steel rods. When completed, it will be 22 feet in diameter and 18 feet high, with a 13-foot wide driveway. Capacity will be approximately 3,000 bushels of ear corn and 2,800 bushels of grain. The finished crib will be rat proof and rot proof.
