Arthur H. Jones Services At Weeping Water

Arthur Henry Jones was born in Weeping Water, October 14, 1875 and passed away at his home November 13, 1950. Excepting for about a year's residence in Alabama and the first year of his married life in Avoca, Nebraska his home was in Weeping Water. He was married to Viva M. Vandenburg of Murdock on June 12, 1898 and one son, Clifford was born to them. He was a barber by trade and for half a century applied himself diligently and efficiently to this work. He served a two year term as assistant postmaster under Postmaster E. D. Travis. His main avocation was music which he held through the years his ardent devotion. Even as a small boy he played an old fashioned organ for the Sunday school of the Congregational church. For many years he played the violin and clarinet, his wife presiding at the piano, for numerous social events and for all High School class plays. And for many years he was pianist for the Odd Fellows lodge meetings. He was one of the first members of the Odd Fellows lodge and in the last two years participated in its activities.

He attended public school in Weeping Water, graduating in the class of 1894. He was a member of the Congregational church, Prairie Lodge No. 25 I. O. O. F., the Royal Arcanum lodge and the Woodland Rebekah Lodge No. 22.
Last January he suffered a severe heart attack in his shop. In July he was a patient for a few weeks in the St. Elizabeth hospital in Lincoln. Since then he has been confined almost entirely to his home, gradually becoming weaker and finally bedfast, for the past two months. For four months his daughter-in-law, Mrs. Clifford Jones helped his wife, Viva, in caring for him.

He leaves to mourn his passing his wife, Viva, a son and his wife, Mr. and Mrs. Ford Jones of River Forest, Illinois, his sister, Mrs. W. W. Davis of Weeping Water, his grandson, and his wife, Dr. and Mrs. Kenneth Jones of Lincoln, three grandchildren, nieces and nephews and several cousins, one of whom, J. Marshall lives in Weeping Water. His friends are multitude. His shop was ever a favorite resort for many residents of Weeping Water and the surrounding territory, not only for his good workmanship, but also because of the never failing friendliness of the man whose cheerfulness, geniality and good citizenship in general will long be gratefully remembered.

Raising Health Costs Subject State Meeting

Health costs of those getting old age assistance, now amounting to nearly \$2,000,000 yearly and gradually increasing, were the subject of conferences by the board of control with both their medical advisory committee and the advisers named from county commissioners at Lincoln.
The medical committee met Monday night and their findings were reported to the board of control with both their medical advisory committee and the advisers named from county commissioners at Lincoln.
Hospitalization increased 20.3 per cent from \$78,012 to \$94,942.

Drug costs increased 12.5 per cent from \$84,283 to \$94,942 per quarter.
It was reported that the number of persons receiving old age relief had declined about 200 last month. This was explained by the fact that about one-half are now getting increased old age insurance enough to make them ineligible. Most of these are in Douglas county. The other half was transferred to blind assistance, where payments removed Thursday by Dr. R. W. Tyson. She is recovering very nicely.

Methods to create more income are \$5 a month higher, tested by county commissioners and have them better informed were discussed. William Diers of the board of control suggested paying a per diem for the time spent as an assistance committee in addition to county board salaries.
Director Neil Vandemoer suggested having members of the state staff visit the counties and explain operations to the board. Erik Riisness, member of the Knox county board suggested that the county assistance directors be instructed to inform new members of the board of the program and save travel costs.

It was admitted that all county board members are not as well informed as in years past, but committee members pointed out that it probably was because of added duties that have been given commissioners. Handbooks explaining the program are seldom read or referred to by the commissioners.
Ross D. Rash of Gordon pointed out the inconsistencies of present laws on secrecy of the assistance program. He said the commissioners are required by law to keep the public in the "ins dealing" with public business. Then the same members become the assistance committee spending public money and all actions must be kept confidential and the public excluded.
Nursing homes of the state now have 4,000 patients and half of them are being paid out of assistance funds, Mrs. Harold Prince, vice-chairman of the board of control reported. She said that a survey at the late hospital in Norfolk showed that the number of seniles admitted in 1920 showed them 29 per cent while this year it has risen to 49 per cent.
