ONE OF THE STRANGEST characters of whom we read in the Old Testament was Melchizedek, "King of Salem and priest of the nion. most high God." Tithes were given him by Abraham when he returned 9:45 from the pursuit of the banded kings who had despoiled Canaan. Thus early in the history of religion was the tithe recognized as 1:30that which a man should return unto God.

The law of the tithe is enlarged in the New Testament into the law of stewardship. All man has comes from God and is to be used by him as a sacred trust. Nothing he has is really his own, to be used just as he pleases. It is to be devoted to the service of God. A man must give all he can, and he should not fall below the ancient tithe. Let every Christian realize his duty with respect to the money that God entrusts to him. For Christian living is bound up with Christian giving.

Blessings come with faithful stewardship. Paul reminds the Corinthians that he who sows bountifully will reap also bountifully. And In writing the Philippians to thank them for their care of him, he states that their gifts met his needs and were a "sacrifice acceptable, well-pleasing unto God."

So can we find joy and satisfaction in giving, knowing that we share with our Lord and Master as we share with others. Jesus does not need our gifts for himself, but he needs them for his work.
