
BAPTISMAL SERVICES

Christmas Seal Sales Near End Of State Drive

As the 1950 Christmas Seal Sale nears Christmas Day, Dr. J. Harry Murphy, Omaha, president of the Nebraska Tuberculosis Association, which sponsors the campaign, this week had a special word of gratitude for the multitude of volunteers who helped with the campaign.

The Seal Sale campaign, which is seeking to raise \$185,000 for tuberculosis prevention and education work of the association for 1951, opened on November 29. But the majority of volunteers had been working for weeks before, checking lists, folding seals and addressing envelopes, Doctor Murphy pointed out. During the campaign, they have worked tirelessly checking returns, and promoting the sale of Seals individually and collectively, he added.

Doctor Murphy stated that throughout the state "Seal Reminders" are now going forth to those who might have mislaid their Christmas Seal letters amid the pile of Christmas mail. "We hope that these little reminders will help us swell our total quickly," added Doctor Murphy, "so that we may be able to plan our work for 1951. There is still a great deal to be done if we want to make our state safe from the scourge of tuberculosis. This disease still is the cause of many deaths among our young people between the ages of 15 and 35 than any other disease."

Funds from Seal Sale are the only ones available to the Nebraska Tuberculosis Association. With 94 per cent of the returns being retained here in the state for the educational and case-finding work of the Association.


We discussed breeds of sheep and how to identify them. We also discussed vitamins and what foods they were in.

Nebraska Safety Patrol Warning Holiday Drivers

Officially, the winter season begins next week. "Signs of its coming have been with us for some weeks, however," declares Captain C. J. Sanders of the Nebraska Safety Patrol.

"Already, a good many motorists and pedestrians have found out through costly accidents how carelessness works with double swiftness on snow-packed or ice-covered streets and roads," he said today. "Many of those accidents were caused by persons driving at the same rate of speed as they do in June on dry pavements and in broad daylight. You just can't drive that way under winter conditions without taking terrible chances."

Captain Sanders warned, "Taking a little more time for any trip will help assure safe arrivals. Keeping eyes on the road, watchful for pedestrians and alert to the actions of fellow drivers, will aid in avoiding accidents. Adjusting speed to hanging road conditions, maintaining a safe distance between vehicles and using tire chains when needed are important factors. All equipment—brakes, lights, tires, tire chains, windshield wiper blades, defroster, battery, and exhaust system—should be in A-1 condition as a safeguard against delays or accidents."

Exam Dates For Drivers License Set

Motor vehicle operator's license examination dates for the year 1951 have been released by the State Highway Patrol. For Cass County, Patrolmen will visit Plattsmouth on the second and fourth Saturday of each month during the morning hours only. Headquarters will be at the courthouse.

No examinations will be given on Sundays or the following legal holidays: January 1, February 12 and 22, April 23, May 30, July 4, September 3, October 12, November 12 and 22, and December 25.

Savings Bond Sales In State Show Increase

Savings Bond sales in Cass County during November amounted to \$26,021.25, according to Walter H. Smith, County Chairman of the Savings Bond Committee.

At the same time, it was announced by Leland R. Hall, State Director for Nebraska, that total sales in Nebraska were \$7,693,847.58.

The Savings Bond trend in Nebraska is following the national pattern with sales to individuals showing an increase, while maturities and redemptions show a decrease, according to Hall. Hall warned Nebraskans not to become excited or fearful over rumors they may hear or read about what is proposed to be done with the large number of Savings Bonds that will mature beginning next fall. A committee composed of some of the leading financial men of the country is working on the problem, and as soon as anything definite is decided it will be announced officially. 
