## Gage County Leads CROP Donations

Thirty-five carloads of bulk foodstuff, with a cash equivalent of approximately \$70,000 have been reported as contributed to the 1950 Christian Rural Overseas Program drive in Nebraska, according to word from State CROP Director Merlin Frantz.

In making the report Dec. 31, Frantz emphasized that the figure was "by no means final." Many of the counties have not submitted final reports.

Unofficial figures show that Gage county leads all counties with a contribution totalling \$6,300. Others showing returns are Hamilton, \$4,580; York, \$4,235; Thayer, \$4,000, and Platte, \$2,998.

Final figures on the 1950 CROP drive should be available in mid-January. By then all counties will have reported.
