Nebraska farmers need to plant nine hundred thousand acres of corn more than they intended to plant on March 1 1951, according to Evan H. Armstrong, chairman Cass County

The Wednesday afternoon Pi- dicated this additional acreage

Mr. Armstrong also pointed out that unless the acreage planted is increased above that indicated on March 1, 1951, the reserve of corn would probably be down to under 300 million present rates of use that would only be about one month's supply which is not enough in times of emergency.

The closing date for signing up for the 1951 farm program is April 15, 1951.


