The Period of Moses  
Lesson for April 22: Deuteronomy  
6: 20-25, 5: 1-6  
Memory Selection: Psalm 119: 18

SEVERAL HUNDRED YEARS after the time of Abraham, his greatest descendant with the exception of Jesus arose in Egypt to lead his people out of bondage. His familiar story surpasses the wonder stories we were told in our childhood. Born a slave, saved by the eyes of his mother, adopted by Pharaoh's daughter, trained in the arts and learning of the Egyptians, and in manhood refusing to be called the son of Pharaoh's daughter to suffer affliction with the people of God, he led the Hebrews out of the land of bondage and through the tests of the wilderness to a sight of the promised land.

On the way from the borders of Egypt, during their sojourn in the wilderness, Moses brought down the Ten Commandments from Sinai. And all the jurisprudence of his people and of ages to come was worked out.

Prior to the Exodus, the great experience of Moses was the sight of the burning bush on the back side of the desert, when he received the call of God. His long residence in the land of Midian made him familiar with the rocks of the wilderness and fitted him to be a guide of his people when they traveled through that section.

Moses was the greatest figure of antiquity. Let us find in him an example of unswerving truth and fidelity because of his implicit trust in God.

The schedule includes home and home series with Omaha University and Maryville. Tentative schedules are being worked out with Wesleyan University, Doane College and Midland college.

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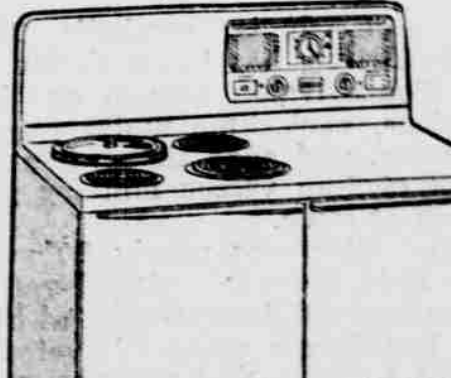
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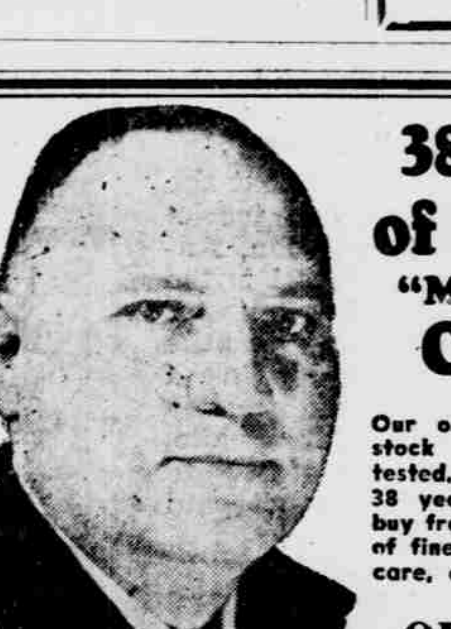
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
