The Creation Genesis 1: 1-5, 26-31

Memory Selection: Psalms 104: 24 TN THE FIRST LESSON of the second quarter we study creation, as we learn of it through the book of Genesis. The first sentence of the first chapter of Genesis is 10:30. very impressive. A great preacher once said to the present writer at 9:45. that if a man can believe the first verse of the Bible he can believe anything in it. That God was in the beginning is certainly the one great and indispensable fact of the universe and of human exist-

We are accustomed to the thought of chaos as prevailing in the beginning. But see how quickly God brought order out of chaos, created the light, appointed day and night, gathered the waters together into seas, clothed the earth with life and beauty and set the ceaseless round of seedtime and harvest, created all the breathing things, and then made man to have dominion over all things.

We cannot know the exact significance of being made in the image of God and after his likeness, but we can certainly realize our oneness with God and be assured that we can trace the quivering thread of human life back through the ages, not to a miscroscopic cell in primordial slime, but to the living God. We can all claim a place in the genealogy that approaches its end with Seth "which was the son of Adam, which was the son of God." So let us look upon ourselves with a new appreciation as we realize our kingship through kinship with God the Father.
