Jesus and His Ministry
Luke 4: 14-22; 19: 10; Mark 10: 45; John 3: 16.

THE EARLY DAYS of his ministry Jesus went to Nazareth, where he had been reared. Given the opportunity to read in the synagogue, he read a passage from Isaiah that Jesus applied to himself. He had come to preach to the poor, to set at liberty the captives, to give sight to the blind, and to heal those that were bruised.

Another time he stated his mission thus: "The Son of man is come to seek and to save that which was lost." There is an interesting use of the tenses in the foregoing sentence. Jesus is come and is present now in every place of need, to seek and to save that which was lost.

Following a strife between the disciples as to which of them should be the greatest in the kingdom, Jesus bade them to be as servants, even as the Son of man had come, not to be ministered unto, but to minister, and to give his life a ransom for many. The sacrificial element is needed to glorify the witness to Christ and to make it successful.

All the labors of Jesus for the salvation of men are to be traced to the divine love which sent Jesus to earth; "For God so loved the world—" This great verse has been strikingly called the "little Bible." The whole of the Bible may be compressed into that one verse. Let us make sure that we accept the Gift of God's love, and minister it unto others.
