Missouri River Development Is Outlined To Club

Plattsmouth Rotarians received an idea of what is involved in controlling the mighty Missouri River Tuesday, when films of the river's work, and of the Army Engineers struggle against the natural activities of the river were shown.

The colored films were part of Herb Freyburg's Tuesday noon program. Freyburg was not present at the meeting. The films were shown by John O'Hare, vets instructor at Plattsmouth, who was a guest of Superintendent Tom Friest.

The films gave Rotarians an idea of the potential effectiveness of barge service on the Missouri, explained a detailed description of the contour of the river, and brought out certain phases of work involved by the engineers.

Of interest to the group also was a visit from Adrian News, Sr., father of Adrian News, former manager of the telephone company office here. The elder News, a Huntingdon, Virginia Rotarian, has served as past governor of district 172 in the upper central part of New York and Canada. He is also a past president of the Huntingdon club.

Aid Society Seeks Membership From Local Residents

Offutt Air Force Base personnel have been combing the city this week seeking local memberships to the Air Force Aid Society. The society provides emergency financial assistance in the form of non-interest bearing loans and grants and finances the higher education of dependent children of Air Force personnel.

Heading the local drive are Lt. Fridena and T/Sgt. C. A. Vernon. While soliciting memberships here, the Air Force also displayed the new car which it will give away Saturday at the base.

New Members of the Aid Society will be permitted to enter Offutt Air Force Base Saturday, the first time in several years the base has been open to the public.

Any individual, either military or civilian, may become a member of the Aid Society by paying the appropriate membership fee. Donations may be for either the general fund or the General Henry H. Arnold Educational Fund. Memberships are \$1 annually, and range from one to five hundred dollars for the various categories. A \$50 donation entitles contributors to life membership.

The Aid Society's funds are rapidly becoming depleted, according to information available here. In 1950 alone, the Society spent nearly \$900,000 while contributions were only \$475,044. In 1949 expenses were nearly one million dollars and income only slightly over \$400,000.

Air Force personnel are an important part of community life in Plattsmouth. Apparently members of the air service will be residents here for many years. By subscribing to the Aid Society, residents here may be helping their neighbor, or providing their children's friends with an adequate education.

The Society expects an increase demand for funds during 1951 due to rapid expansion of the Air Force. It hopes that friends of the Society will continue to support, and will enlarge their support to meet increased demands.
