Thanksgiving Services Are Scheduled During The Week

Churches throughout Platts-mouth and Cass county will hold special Thanksgiving services this week, prior to the day of Thanksgiving which this year falls on November 22 in Nebraska.

Both evening and morning services are planned by the various religious organizations. In addition other groups are planning to bring the Thanksgiving theme into their regular mid-week services.

Thanksgiving services will be held Wednesday evening at the Christ Lutheran church on the Platts-mouth-Louisville road. Services start at eight o'clock.

Also at eight o'clock Wednesday night, the annual Thanksgiving service of Platts-mouth will be held at the Methodist church with Rev. M. L. Schafer of the United Brethren church of Myard delivering the sermon. Local protestant churches are united for the service.

The Christian and United Presbyterian congregations of Murray will unite in a Thanksgiving service Wednesday evening, November 21. The meeting will be held at the Christian church.

Rev. Val Johnson will prepare the order of service, and Rev. Roy P. Morris, pastor of the United Presbyterian church, will preach the sermon. Theme of the service will be "Think and Thank."

First Lutheran church, Washington and Avenue D, will hold a special Thanksgiving Eve vesper service, Wednesday, November 21.

This vesper service will begin at 7:30 p.m. and will feature hymns by the audience, organ music by Mrs. A. W. Huebner and a Thanksgiving sermon, "Father, I Thank Thee," by Pastor George Munding.

The community is invited to participate in this special service of Thanksgiving.

Thanksgiving services will be held at Immanuel Lutheran church four miles southwest of Louisville Thursday morning at ten o'clock.

Auxiliary Prepares For Sale Of Christmas Seals

Volunteer workers for the 1951 Christmas Seal Sale are preparing for the mailing of sheets of the new Christmas Seals to county residents for the Cass County Tuberculosis Association.

The 1951 Christmas Seal Sale begins with the mail delivery of Christmas Seals to residents throughout the county. The sale will be used to finance the 1952 program of the association.

Members of the local unit of the American Legion Auxiliary are giving their time for accomplishing the task, under the direction of Miss Mildred Hall, county chairman for the Seal Sale campaign.

Mrs. Dorothy Janecek, secretary of the county association, has visited Union, Nehawka and Weeping Water to check the mailing file in those communities with members of the American Legion Auxiliary.

When county residents open their Christmas Seal letters next week, they will find the jolly face of Santa Claus smiling at them. The Christmas Seal also bears the red double-barred cross, which appears on the Christmas Seal every year, regardless of changes in design.

The double-barred cross is the international symbol of the fight against tuberculosis and the registered insignia of the National Tuberculosis Association and its affiliates, including the Cass County Tuberculosis Association. Its appearance each year on the Christmas Seal assures the public that in purchasing Christmas Seals they are contributing to the support of an organization dedicated to fighting tuberculosis, a communicable disease.

Robert Stephens, artist, of Newark, New Jersey, is designer of the 1951 Seal. His design was selected by the national association advisory committee, composed of representatives of affiliated associations, which selects the seal each year from designs submitted by artists throughout the country.
