Vigorous control of the highways, enforcement of local and state laws, and a closer check on violations cut the number of traffic deaths in Cass county during 1951 while the state as a whole was showing a decided

Solomon said only three traffic fatalities were reported in the county during 1951, lowest in recent years. At the same time an all-time record for traffic fatalities was set in Nebraska. The record was established in Cass county despite bad road conditions caused by heavy
