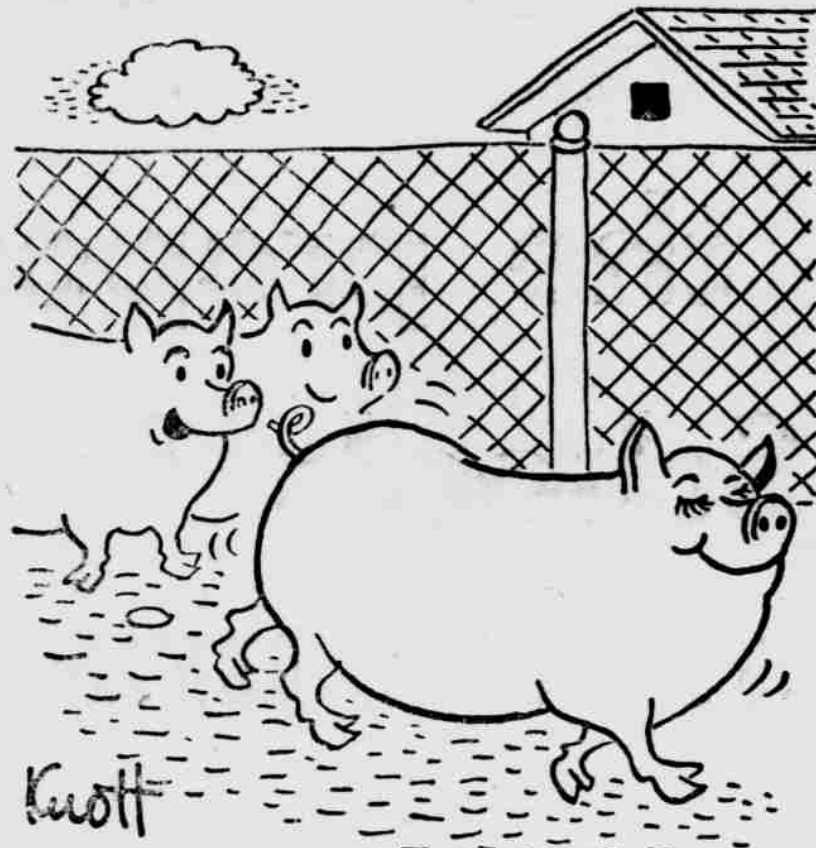

## ?...Have You Ever Wondered...?

Q: What is the candlepower of the full Moon and of the Sun?  
A: The Sun's brightness in candlepower is about four billion billion billion (i. e., four followed by 27 zeros). Since the Sun is about half a million times as bright as the full Moon, the latter would be equivalent to about 8,000 billion billion candlepower.

Q: What is the heaviest atom yet discovered?  
A: This is californium, whose production by means of high energy particles from the cyclotron at the University of California was announced early in 1950. Its atom is 244 times as heavy as the lightest atom of hydrogen, which is the lightest known.

Q: How far is the horizon, as seen over the ocean by a person standing at the water's edge?  
A: Astounding his eyes are five feet high, the horizon would be at a distance of about three miles. At ten feet, it would be about 4.2 miles away and at 50 feet about 7.2 miles. From an airplane a mile high, the distance would be about 95 miles.
