for, service in 1927. Funds for the building were raised through contributions from residents of the community, including servicemen, but the larger amount of the money was from Legion activities, dances, fairs and carnivals. The building cost some \$20,000 and it was necessary to carry a portion of that cost over through the years until it was finally paid off in the late 30's through the efforts of members and various activities. Leased to a garment making plant the building has brought a nice monthly income to the Legion and furnishes a place of employment to a large number of local people.


