VOTE FOR X EMERGENCY BRIDGE LEVY

The bridges in Cass county have been seriously damaged, and many destroyed by floods, during the past few years, throwing a tremendous burden on the road building funds in the county, seriously curtailing improvement of roads within the county.

The Cass County Farm Bureau being vitally concerned with county road improvement feels that an emergency fund should be established to repair bridges, thus expediting the improvement of roads, therefore, in accordance with a Resolution adopted at the annual meeting of Oct. 23, 1951 Louisville, Nebraska. The organization has requested the county commissioners to submit the following proposition to the voters of Cass County.

"Shall the Board of County Commissioners of Cass County, Nebraska, beginning in the year 1952 and for one additional year thereafter exceed the levy of 50c on the one hundred dollar valuation fixed by Section 23-117 R. S. 1943, by levying one and six-tenths (1 6/10) mills on the dollar valuation on all taxable property in Cass County, Nebraska, for the construction, maintenance and repair of bridges all in addition to the levy authorized by law for county purposes and in addition to the legal levy limits; provided, the total levy for bridges shall not exceed one and six-tenths (1 6/10) mills, including the levy herein authorized."
