"We arrived in Yokosuka, Japan, March 21 and I guess we are going to spend about three weeks here and then take off for Pearl Harbor. We will stay in Pearl Harbor two or three days, and then head for the states," the navy veteran writes.

Fleischman also writes that he has been on liberty with Bob Moore several times. "His ship is docked about a half a block from ours and you should have seen him when I walked into his office," he writes his mother. "He darn near fell over when I walked in. It was sure good to see Bob again. I guess he likes the navy pretty well," the sailor writes.

On night duty on the U. S. S. Antietam, airplane carrier, Fleischman said that "nobody thought we were good enough to come out here (Korea) at first but we came out and broke darn near all the records other carriers have set," he explains.

The Plattsmouth sailor is looking forward to a 30-day leave as soon as his ship returns to the states.
