ORDINANCE NO. 866
AN ORDINANCE CREATING STREET IMPROVEMENT DISTRICT NO. 103 IN THE CITY OF PLATTSMOUTH, NEBRASKA, DEFINING ITS BOUNDARIES AND PROVIDING FOR THE IMPROVEMENT OF CERTAIN STREETS BY PAVING, AND SUCH OTHER WORK AS MAY BE INCIDENTAL THERE-TO.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor and Council of the City of Plattsmouth, Nebraska:

Section 1. The Mayor and Council of the City of Plattsmouth, in the County of Cass, and State of Nebraska, hereby find and declare:

That a petition signed by more than sixty per cent of the resident owners owning property directly abutting upon First Street from the south property line of Rock Street, also known as Fourth Avenue to the South property line of Eighth Avenue, and on Eighth Avenue from the East property line of First Street to a point 40 feet West of the West line of the alley running North and South through Block 12 in Thompson's Addition to the City of Plattsmouth, has been presented and filed with the City Clerk, petitioning for the improvement hereinafter described, and

That it is to the best interest of the City to create Street Improvement District Number 103.

Section 2. There is hereby created within the City of Plattsmouth, Nebraska, a street improvement district to be known as Street Improvement District No. 103, the outer boundaries of which are as follows:

Beginning at the intersection of the West property line of Lot 1 in Block 172 in the Original Town, now City of Plattsmouth, Nebraska, with the South property line of Rock Street, also known as Fourth Avenue;

Thence East along the South property line of Rock Street to its intersection with the East property line of Lot 14 in Block 173 in the Original Town now City of Plattsmouth, Nebraska;

Thence South along the East property line extended of said Lot 14 to its intersection with the South property line of Gold Street, also known as Fifth Avenue;

Thence East along the South property line of Gold Street to its intersection with the East property line of Lot 14 in Block 12 in Thompson's Addition to the City of Plattsmouth, Nebraska;

Thence South along the East property line of said Lot 14 to its intersection with the South property line of Lot 14 in said Block 10;

Thence West along the South property line of said Lot 18 to its intersection with the East property line of First Street;

Thence North along the said line 40 feet West of and parallel to its intersection with the West property line of First Street to the North property line of Lot 22 in said Block 12;

Thence East along the North property line extended of said Lot 22 to its intersection with the West property line of Lot 4 in Block 11 in said Thompson's Addition;

Thence North along the West property line extended of said Lot 4 to its intersection with the South property line of Gold Street, also known as Fifth Avenue;

Thence West along the South property line of said Gold Street to its intersection with the West property line extended of Lot 7 in Block 172 in the Original Town now City of Plattsmouth, Nebraska;

Thence North along the West property line extended of the said Lot 7 to point of beginning.

Section 3. The following streets within said District are hereby ordered improved by paving, to-wit:

FIRST STREET from the South property line of Rock Street, also known as Fourth Avenue to the South property line of Eighth Avenue, together with all included intersections.

EIGHTH AVENUE from the East property line of First Street to a point 40 feet West of the West line of the alley running North and South through Block 12 in Thompson's Addition to said City of Plattsmouth, together with all included intersections.

All work essential for or necessarily incidental to the construction of said improvement shall be done in connection therewith and as part thereof.

Section 4. All of said improvements shall be constructed to the established grades as fixed by Ordinances of the City, and shall be constructed in accordance with plans and specifications to be made by Henning-Duthman & Richardson, Inc., Consulting Engineers, employed by the City, and to be approved by the Council. Said improvements shall be made at public cost, but special assessments on the specially benefitted property shall be levied to reimburse the City to the extent provided by law.
