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Allied Hopes To **Begin New Plant During Summer**

Hugo Riemer, president of the newly formed nitrogen division of Allied Chemical and Dye Company, at an Omaha press conference late Wednesday afternoon stated hopes were held to get construction of their new \$25 million plant underway yet this summer.

The plant, covering some 2000 acres just north of Plattsmouth at the junction of the Platte and Missouri rivers, is the largest in the nation devoted to the production of urea and nitrogen fertilizer. It will be one of three plants now operated by Allied. Others are located at South int, Ohio, and Hopewell, Va., the latter two devoted to nitrogen products.
