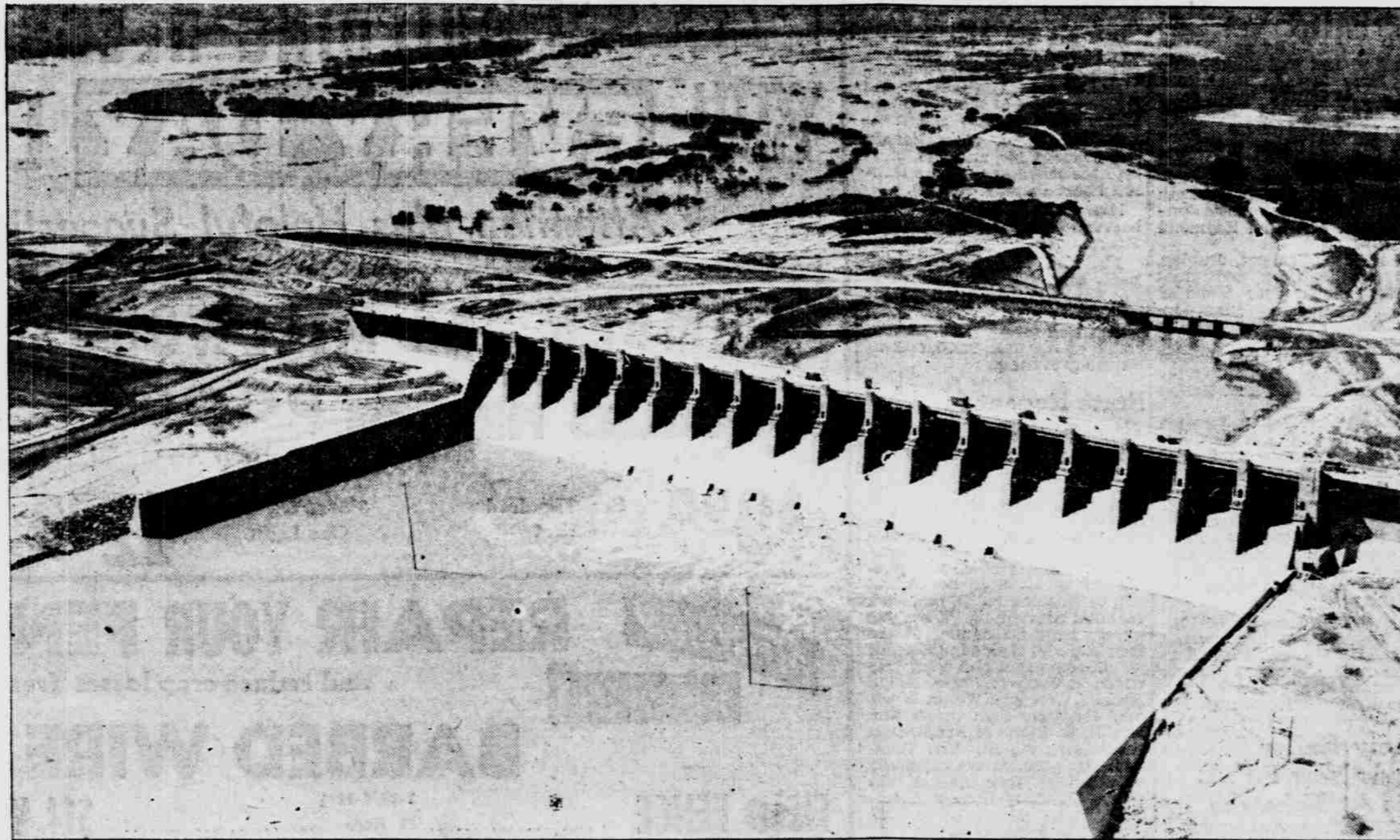

Thousands Attend Harlan County Dam Dedication Tuesday



An aerial photo, above, shows the immense Harlan County Dam, which was dedicated at ceremonies held at Alma and Republican City and at the dam

site Tuesday. The dam stands across the Republican River valley near Republican City and is a unit of the Pick-Sloan Plan for flood-control. The structure

is two and one half miles long, including a concrete spillway 1,350 feet long and towers 107 feet above the bed of the river. The huge dam will impound

run-off water from 20,753 square miles or 83 percent of the drainage area of the Republican river watershed. Its total storage capacity will be 850,000 acre-feet

of which 500,000 acre-feet are allocated to flood control and 350,000 to irrigation, conservation and silting reserve.

Thousands Of Species Taken; Only 39 Stocked

An average stocking in Nebraska waters ranges anywhere from five hundred to several thousand fish. In 1944, however, only 39 of Nebraska's "wonder fish" were released in McConaughy reservoir and since that time, thousands and thousands of that species have been caught.

Though these many thousands of fish have been taken and are still being caught, not one other fish of that species has ever been released in McConaughy since the original 39 in 1944.



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
