Tips On Freezing Beans Offered

Here are some tips on freezing beans, green or wax—from University of Nebraska home economists:

Select young, tender, stringless beans that snap when broken. Wash them thoroughly, then remove the ends.

Cut in one or two-inch pieces, or slice lengthwise into strips for frenched—or julienne style—snap beans. Heat in boiling water for three minutes. Chill promptly in cold water and drain. Pack into containers, leaving a half inch head space. Seal and freeze.
