Industry Growth To Affect Workers

The greatest single factor influencing the labor supply picture during June was the entrance of youth into the labor market in the Omaha area, which includes Plattsmouth and the north half of the county, according to Russell A. Hand, manager of the Omaha office of the state employment service. Hand disclosed that nearly 400 workers registered for summer employment in June. At the end of the month, interest in corn detasseling was light, but has since picked up.

But the labor demand is characterized by a reduction in the

needs for all types of workers. Hand predicts continued expansion of industry in the area and a need for approximately 700 workers during July and August.
