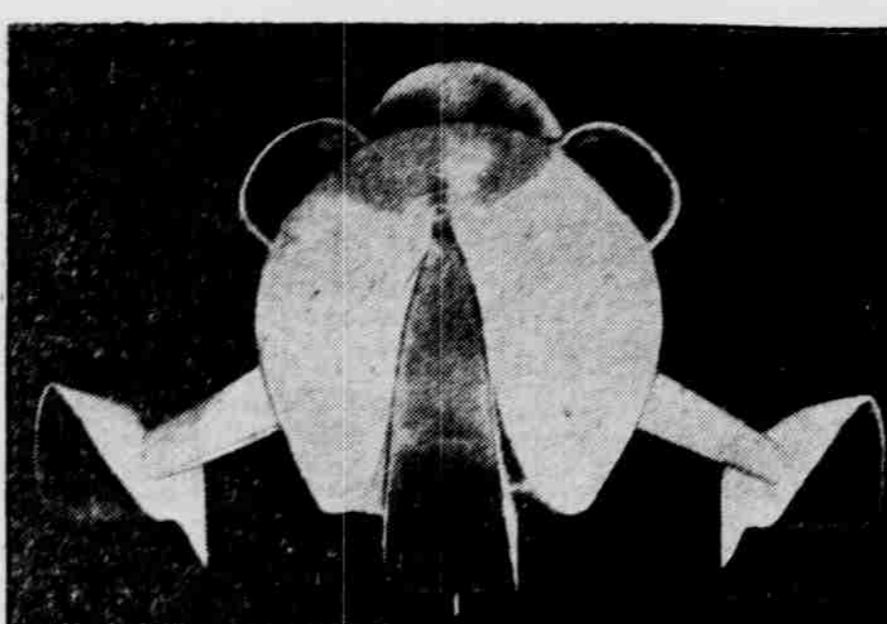

Nine Entries In Chicken Test

Nine entries of 50 chicks each have been placed on feed for the Nebraska Chicken of Tomorrow contest.

Extension Poultryman J. H. Claybaugh of the University of Nebraska, who is chairman of the Nebraska event, said eight strain crosses and breed crosses are being compared with a popular New Hampshire strain in the contest.

The chicks are to be weighed and the records closed when the chicks are 10 weeks of age. At that time chicks from each entry are to be selected for exhibition at the Nebraska state fair. The birds will be 13 weeks old when the fair opens.

Those who made entries in the contest include the Hill Hatchery of Lincoln, the Spidel Hatchery of Waverly, the M. L. Burnham hatchery of Adams and the University of Nebraska.

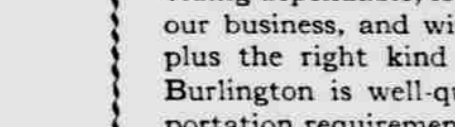
