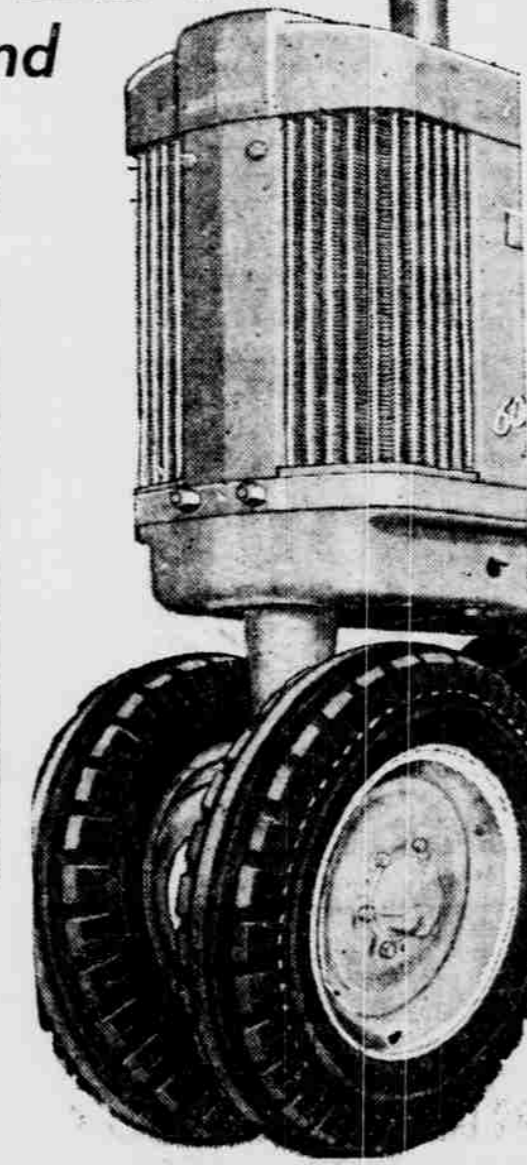
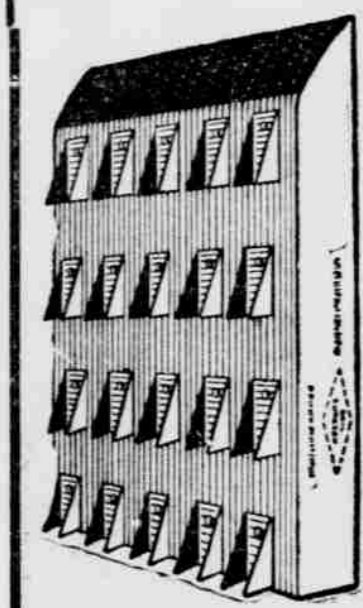

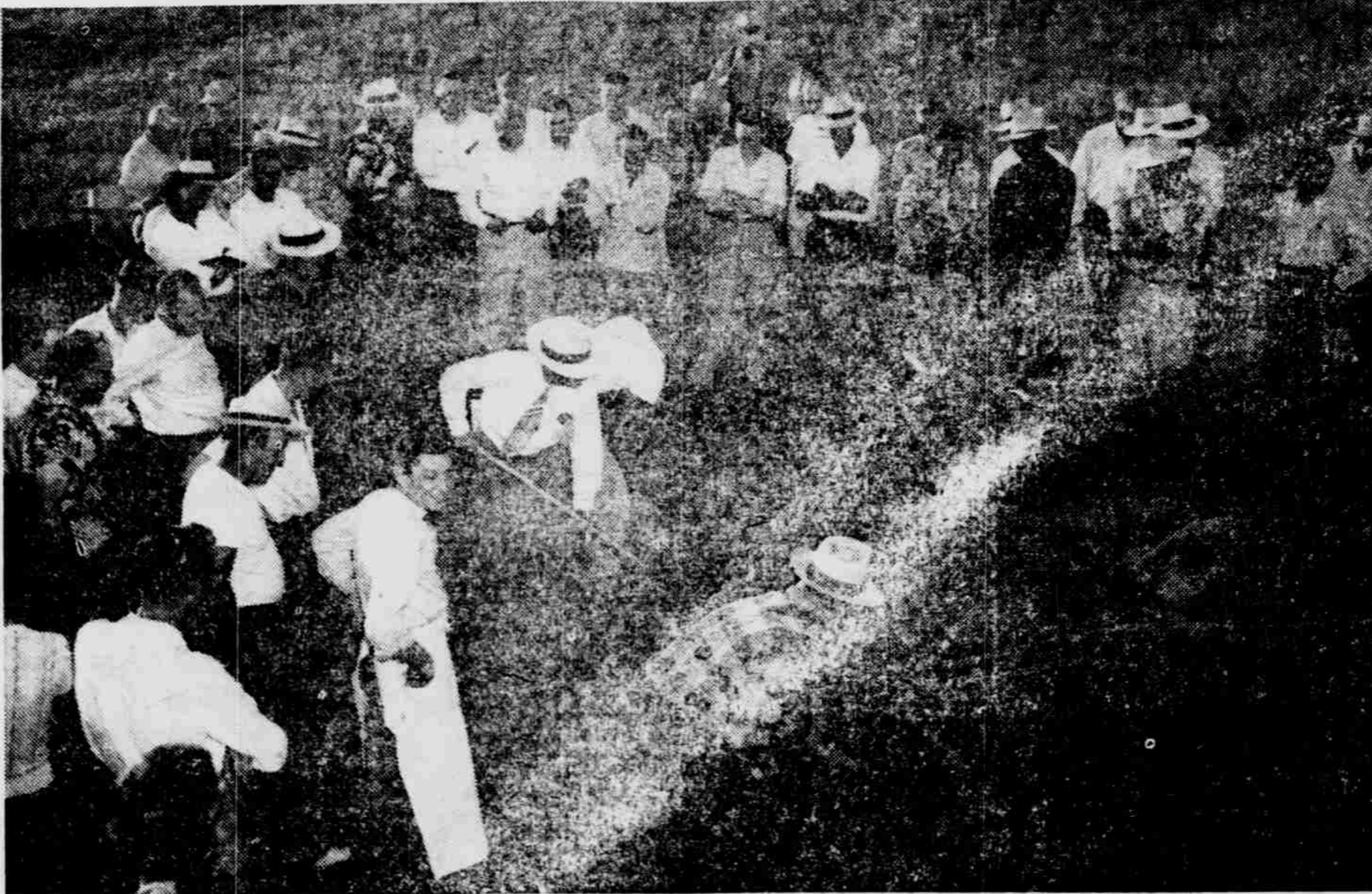

Plattsmouth outhit Springfield 13-9 Sunday but dropped a 5-4 extra inning tilt in D-S-C league competition. An error and three hits brought in the winning run in the eighth inning after teams had agreed to play only seven frames.

Springfield jumped into a three run lead in the first inning on a hit batsman, two walks and two hits. The lead stood up until the fifth when Plattsmouth rallied for three runs. Springfield added a fourth run in the third.

Pierce walked to open Plattsmouth's fifth, and went around on successive doubles by LeRoy Wilson and Rich Wohlfarth. Vroman scored Wohlfarth with the third tally by singling. Hobbs followed with the fourth hit of the inning but Wurzer and Gustafson struck out to end the rally.

Fabric Lamp Shade, Is Washable, Home Economist Explains

Fabric lamp shades which are soiled and not glued to the frame may be washed at home, according to Miss Gersilda Guthrie, extension home economist at the University of Nebraska. Here is how to do it:

Dust the shade with a soft brush. Be sure to get the dust out of the pleats, looms and trimmings. If the shade has colored trimmings, test it to see whether the color will run if it does, remove the trimmings and wash separately. Remove any metal or other non-washable trimmings.

Plunge the shade into the laundry or bath tub filled with thick suds made of luke warm water and mild soap. Brush gently with a soft brush inside and out. Repeat the process in clean suds. Rinse several times, using clean water of the same temperature and set the shade on a bath towel to dry. Dry the shade as quickly as possible.

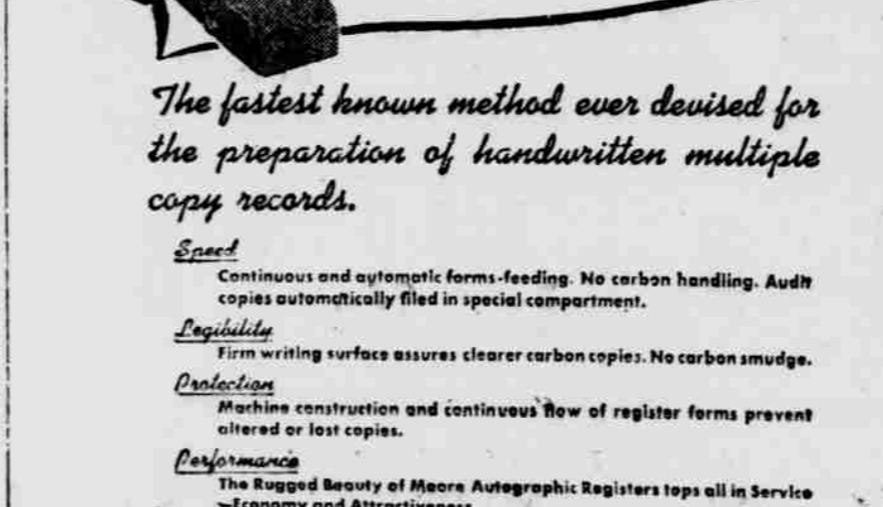
