> **Economist Explains** Fabric lamp shades which are education. sewed and not glued to the frame may be washed at home according to Miss Gersilda Guthrie, extension home economist at the University of Nebraska. Here is how to do it: Dust the shade with a soft brush. Be sure to get the dust out of the pleats, loops and trimmings. If the shade has colored trimmings, test it to see whether the color will run. If it does

remove the frimmings and wash separately. Remove any metal or other non-washable trimmings. Plunge the shade into the laundry or bath tub filled with thick suds made of luke warm water and mild soap. Brush gently with a soft brush inside and out. Repeat the process in clean suds. Rinse several times. using clean water of the same temperature and set the shade on a bath towel to dry. Dry the shade as quickly as possible.
