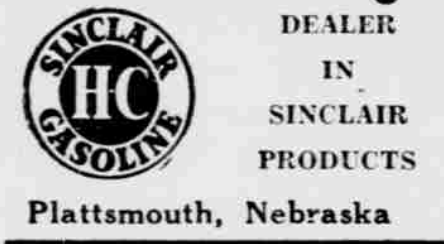
BOARD OF EDUCATION PROCEEDINGS

Plattsmouth came through with seven hits, the same number yielded by Blotzer. Blotzer struck out seven but gave 12 free tickets.

Nehawka Coach Lists August 25 For Grid Start

Nehawka six-man football team will check out equipment on the 22nd and will begin practice on Monday, August 25, according to Teddy Schiessler, new coach at Nehawka who began moving into the community Thursday.
Schiessler will be serving his first year as coach at Nehawka succeeding Jerry Mutschall.
A graduate of Midland college, Schiessler coached at Stuart last year. He's looking for a good season at Nehawka, with a number of lettermen expecting to report. He attended McCook Junior College for two years before transferring to Midland college and has a daughter.
In Plattsmouth Friday, the Nehawka coach explained that they are trying to iron out a conflict on their six-man schedule. The season will get underway two weeks after school opens on September 2.

New Automobile Liability Rates Now In Effect

New automobile liability insurance rates for Nebraska were announced recently by the National Bureau of Casualty Underwriters. The revision is part of a countrywide movement to bring the rates for this form of insurance into line with the current accident frequency and cost of claims incurred by insured motorists.
The revisions apply to rates for basic limits coverage, which means protection up to \$5,000 for bodily injury for one person, up to \$10,000 for bodily injury resulting from one accident, and up to \$5,000 for property damage.
For private passenger cars the rate increases ranges from \$3 to \$9 depending upon the loss record of the policy.
Automobile accidents continue to increase, according to reports from the Nebraska Department of Roads and Irrigation. 8,438 men, women and children were killed or injured in Nebraska during 1951 compared with 7,530 in 1950.
According to Stephen M. Davis, local insurance man and a member of the National Bureau of Casualty Underwriters, Nebraska was one of eight states which in 1951 did not have a raise in auto liability and property damage rates.
