

Falls City Halts Blue Devil Win String 27-6

A strong Falls City Tiger football team roared into Platts-mouth Friday night and walked off with a 27-6 conquest of the Platts-mouth Blue Devils.

Coach Merle Stewart's charges didn't come to life until the second half, when they played the Tigers on even terms. But during the first two periods, the Tigers built up a 20 point lead and was never seriously threatened.

Tom Livingston, senior scat back, scored Platts-mouth's lone tally on a 24-yard run around end to cut the deficit to 20-6 after three periods.

Gibson scored all of the Tiger touchdowns as Falls City scored on both running and passing combinations. Gibson went 20 yards for the first touchdown around his own right end for a 6-0 lead, and in the second period went over center for one yard and a 13-0 lead. He scored later in the same period on a pass from Sorensen, good for 42 yards, and added the final Falls City marker in the final period on a 26-yard pass from Sorensen.

A few breaks could have made a different story in the final outcome but the all-around

strength of Jack McIntyre's Tigers was too much for the Blue Devils.

Statistics show that the second half was comparatively even after Falls City dominated the first half play. The Tigers rolled up 96 and 98 yards rushing in the first two periods, while holding Platts-mouth to 8 and minus one yards in the same two periods.

After the intermission though Platts-mouth registered 27 yards in the third period to 45 for Falls City and 54 in the final canto to 82 for the Tigers.

One of the most bruising battles of the season, the game left Platts-mouth with a long list of injured gridlers. Tackles Dick Glaze and Dick March saw only limited duty as both received leg injuries early in the fray. Also suffering leg wounds were John Schuetz, junior fullback; John Blotzer, senior halfback; and Tom Conis, senior quarterback. Jerry Fulton, end, suffered a rib injury as well.

Coach Merle Stewart expressed satisfaction with the play of most of the Blue Devils, but pointed out that one guard spot appeared weak.

Platts-mouth threatened on several occasions with DeWayne Noell and Jon Schuetz threatening to go the distance. On two occasions it took the safety to stop Noell when he appeared en route to a TD.

A non-conference game for Platts-mouth, it was their second loss in five games. They are undefeated in the East Nebraska Eight conference.

Duck Season Opens; Now Hunters Want Pheasants

Platts-mouth and Cass county nimrods opened their onslaught against ducks Saturday and are now awaiting opening of the pheasant season on October 17.

Ducks were apparently plentiful on the opening days of the season despite very mild and warm weather here during the past weeks. Many hunters reported getting their limit early on opening day but are expecting to find it a little tougher unless cooler weather strikes.

Earlier last week, many Nebraska hunters reported good luck across the river in the Missouri river and Forney Lake areas.

Two zones have been established for the pheasant season which opens on October 17. In one zone the season is limited to ten days while in the remainder of the state the season will be open until November 23.

Zone two, for which the season runs only until October 26, consists of Boyd, Blaine, Brown, Cherry, Garfield, Grant, Holt, Hooker, Keya Paha, Loup, Rock, Thomas and Wheeler counties in the western part of the state.

Zone one includes all other counties in which pheasants are legal game until November 23. Shooting hours are from sunrise to sunset in both zones, however the limit in zone two is two cock pheasant, while four is the bag and possession limit in zone 1.

Grouse are also legal game in ten western counties this week only.

Heavy week end activity was noted along the Missouri and Platte river areas and along smaller waterways and ponds in the Cass county area. Along with local hunters, nimrods from the Omaha area swelled the total number of duck hunters here.

Blue Devils To Test Wahoo In Homecoming Tilt

Coach Merle Stewart's Blue Devils will seek to extend their East Nebraska Eight conference lead in a homecoming tilt with Wahoo at Memorial Athletic Field Friday night.

Currently riding the crest of the conference standings along with Blair, the Devils will tangle with one of the stronger conference teams when they play host to the Warriors in the annual Platts-mouth high school homecoming game.

Wahoo dropped its first conference test Friday when Blair, top ranked conference team, nipped the Warriors in a thriller. The Wahoo loss left Blair and Platts-mouth the only undefeated teams in the conference.

With a full week of grid activity slated for the Platts-mouth football squad, and with many varsity players currently on the injured list, the Blue Devils may find it tough sledding. Because of injuries, Coach Merle Stewart may be forced to limit practice sessions to fundamentals this week.

In addition to the homecoming tilt with Wahoo Friday night, the Platts-mouth Reserves play the Weeping Water first team Wednesday night at Weeping Water, and the junior high team meets Bellevue here Thursday night.

Platts-mouth and Wahoo battled to a 14-14 tie at Wahoo last year when the Warriors captured the conference crown. The tilt should be one of the best to be played on the home field this fall.
