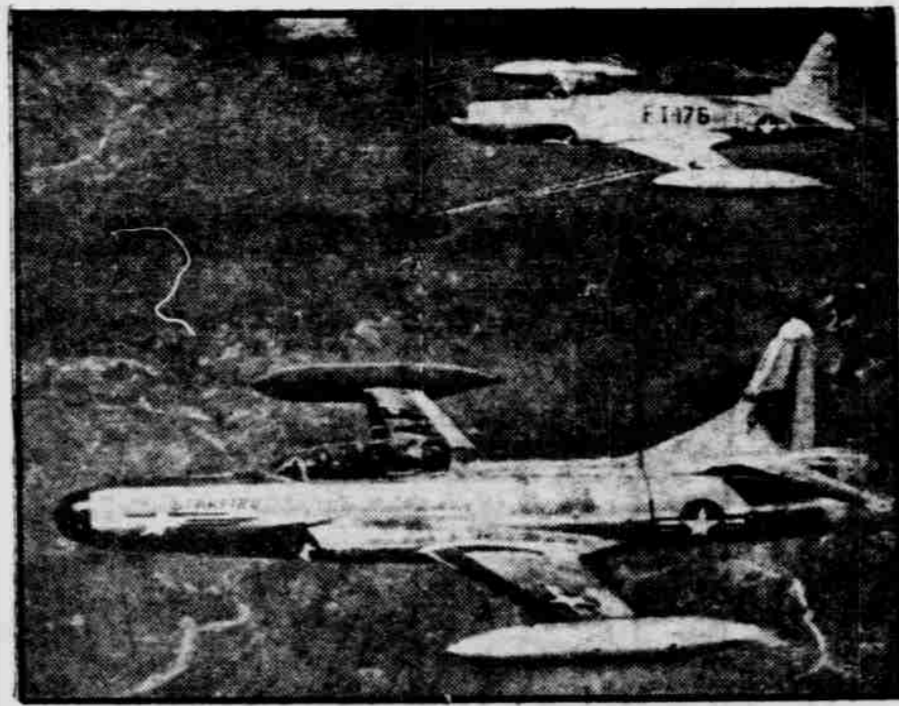
Mrs. Frank Lemon was program leader and she spoke of Home Missions Winning Home Rights.

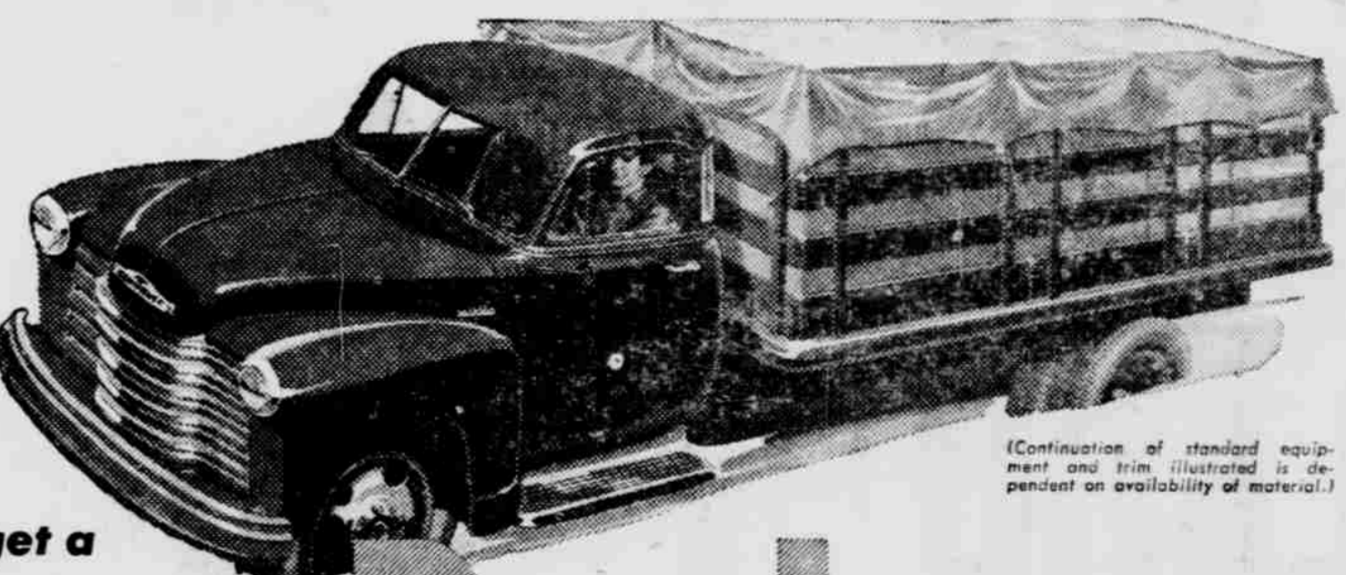

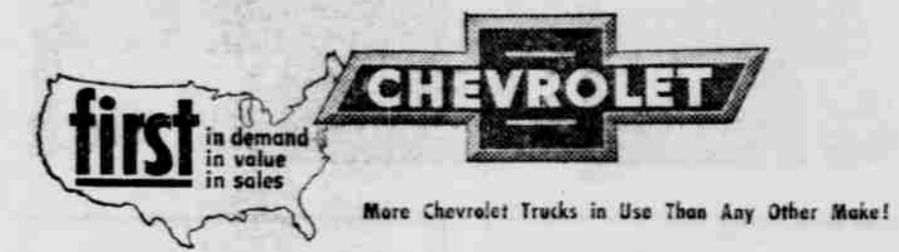
