The 1953 National First Aid and Mine Safety Contest is expected to attract at least 60 teams from upwards of twenty states.

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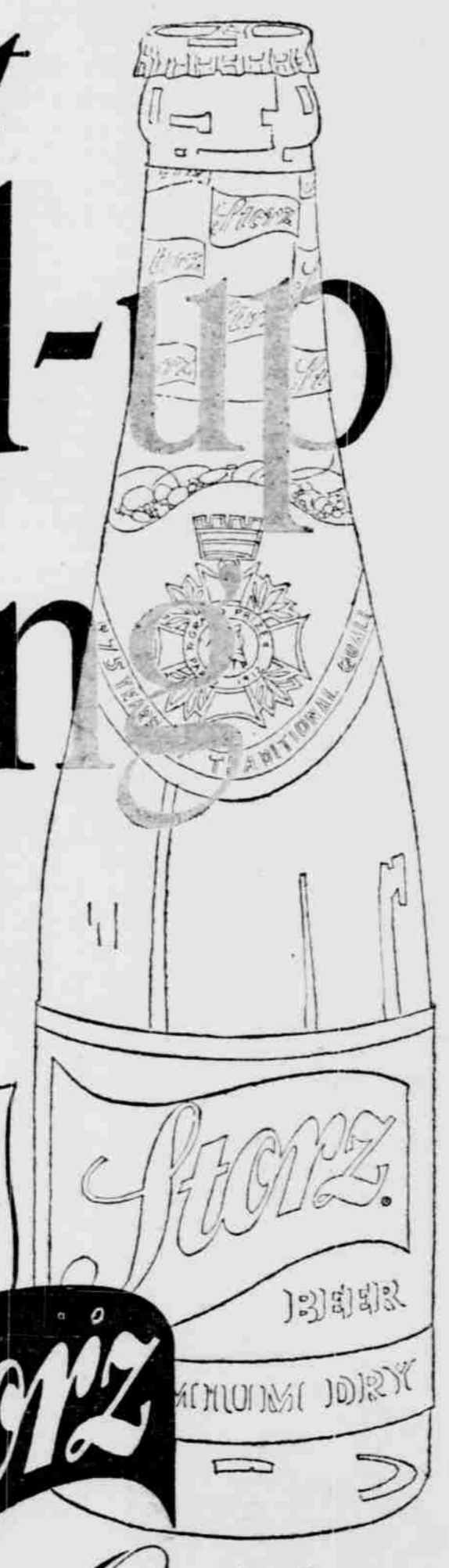
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
