

The October drought continued without any precipitation until November 16. On that date, heavy rains fell over southeastern Nebraska with 1.25 inches recorded here. Snow later in the month, and still on the ground, added to the overall

The report explains that the corn harvest was practically completed during the first half of the month. Conditions were rather unfavorable, as the stalks and shanks were so dry that many ears dropped before they could be caught by the picker mechanism. An abnormally large amount of shelling in the pickers was also reported.
