PAY SCALE UP

Hourly wage scales of union building trades workers rose 15 cents an hour on the average between mid-1951 and mid-1952, according to the Bureau of Labor Statistics, which announces the results of a survey of construction workers' wages in 77 cities. Skilled workers' wages moved up 16 cents an hour, while those of helpers and laborers averaged 11 cents higher. Brick-layers averaged \$3.10 an hour in mid-1952, lathers \$3, plasterers \$3.10 and stone-masons \$3.15.
