

Dairymen Regain League Lead; Standings Altered

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Nehawka Presses But Bows 48-47 To Weeping Water

Counting heavily from the free throw line, Coach Ted Schiessler's Nehawka quintet pressed Weeping Water right down to the wire Tuesday before bowing to Darwin Salestrom's crew, 48-47 in an overtime.

Nehawka, with Tom Johnson hitting 10 of 15 gift tosses, came through with 17 of 228, while Weeping Water was hitting only 8 of 28.

Meanwhile, Salestrom's crew outscored Nehawka from the floor, 20-15.

Nehawka broke into an early lead with Raymond Mayfield, Alvin Turner and Johnson scoring heavily to take a 17-11 first period lead. Weeping Water closed the gap, however, in the second period and trailed only 26-27 at intermission.

Free throws in the third period enabled the Nehawka crew to hold on but Weeping Water fashioned a one-point, 39-38 margin after three quarters. Schiessler's crew battled back to tie at the end of regulation play but bowed in the overtime.

Jim Stacey captured scoring honors by hitting 19 on 8 field goals and 3 gift tosses for Weeping Water quintet. Raymond Mayfield led Nehawka with 16 while Johnson added 14 more.

Also scoring for Nehawka were Joe Snyder, 7; Alvin Turner, 6; and Dale Brunns, 4.

Nehawka Rally Nets 63-57 Win From Otoe Cagers

Overcoming a 21-30 halftime deficit, Nehawka struck a blistering pace and went on to defeat Otoe 63-57 in a non-conference battle Friday night.

Unable to stop Otoe Center Ron Witt, Coach Ted Schiessler's crew settled for all-around team scoring to produce the extra points.

Otoe, paced by Witt, climbed into a 15-11 first quarter lead and was in front 30-21 at halftime. That's when Nehawka went to work.

Scoring 20 points on 10 field goals, while holding Otoe to 8 points, Coach Schiessler's crew forced a 41-38 margin at the three quarter mark. Tom Johnson and Raymond Mayfield gunned the Nehawka attack.

The Cass countians refused to cool off in the final period and poured another 22 points through the net as Mayfield and Johnson continued to hit regularly.

Battling on even terms right down to the wire, Eagle nipped Avoca in a tightly fought Cass County Conference battle Tuesday night 39-37. It was the first conference win for Eagle against three losses, and the third loss for Avoca against one win.

Coach Bill Mickelson's Avoca Cardinals broke away in the first period and seemed bound for its second loop win by building a 6-1 first quarter lead, but Eagle struck back with 15 points to knot the count at 16-all at halftime.

Both teams came through with 15 points during the thrilling third quarter as the count remained tied at 31-31. Four field goals for Eagles against one field goal and 4 gift tosses for Avoca provided the winning margin in the final period.

Schmidt and weyers led the winning Eagle quintet with 14 points each while Kropp came through with 10 more. Ayers hit one and Stubbs and Umland failed to score.
