Jesus Changed Intense Narrowness To Great Tolerance

OUTSTANDING among the 12 disciples were three intense men of strong character and ambition. These were Peter and the two brothers, James and John. The brothers lacked some of Peter's weakness and had the benefit of steady, persistent ambition, Jesus called them "Sons of Thunder."
 But the three men were united in their intense desire to have places of power and preference in the earthly kingdom which they supposed Jesus was going to establish.
 The mother of James and John, wife of Zebedee, was also very anxious that her sons have authority and preference in the kingdom, even asking Jesus to give her boys places on His left and His right when He established the kingdom.
 The fact that Jesus was able to hold the loyalty and devotion of these men after they discovered that His kingdom was to be spiritual, not earthly, is a marvelous thing indeed. They suppressed their ideas of worldly power and became even more loyal and unselfish than before, applying their abilities to the task.
 When Jesus explained that the places asked for were not His to give, and that they would suffer much in the future, their answer was: "We are able." And they were able. They became powerful personalities. They achieved a stature of most men a never dream of.
 Perhaps the best example of change in the "Sons of Thunder" is revealed when we recall their earlier fiery tempers and the request that the Lord call down fire from heaven to consume inhospitable villagers. Compare this to John, later so gentle he describes the transition: "We know we have passed from death into life because we love the brethren," and "Little children love one another."
