Seniors Tackle Difficult Play, The Robe, April 9-10

Presentation of "The Robe" by the senior class of Plattsouth high school has been set for April 9 and 10 at the high school auditorium.

The play, in three acts, is an adaptation of Lloyd Douglas' famous book by the same title. It is the story of the soldier who threw dice for Christ's robe, and won.

Putting on the play will be a tremendous task for the senior class, Sponsor Joe York notes. There are twenty-two speaking parts, and each act has three scenes, necessitating many changes of scenery. Ordinarily, high school students do not put on such a difficult play but the class intends to make a success of it, the sponsor said.

Setting of the plot is in Palestine during the first two acts, and in Rome during the third. Marcellus, the soldier who won the robe, experiences an unusual sensation when he puts on the robe, and the play revolving about his experiences, is climaxed with a banquet in the imperial palace at Capri.
