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## **South Park Sewer Bid Is Accepted**; **New One Plotted**

City Councilmen Monday night accepted bids on one sanitary sewer district and set the machinery in motion on a second. Bids were accepted on the South Park sanitary sewer which will serve a 15-20 block area south of third street and east of 9th, while preliminary steps were taken toward creation of a sanitary sewer district for the Valley View housing project and adjacent property.

Sesto Construction Company of Omaha was low bidder on the South Park project with a bid of \$42,698.40, from two to six thousand dollars under the other three bids.

The school district will ask only \$107,750 by taxation for the next fiscal year in the \$175,250 budget approved by the board Monday night. The tax amount is the same as was raised a year ago in the districts \$162,000 budget.
