

Interest Growing In Submergible Pumps In Nebraska

Apparently there is a growing interest on the part of Nebraska farmers in the use of submergible pumps for farm water supply and irrigation.

Mike Mumbaard, farm electrification specialist at the University of Nebraska, says this type of pump has become more popular in the last few years. The pump, however, is not new as it has been used in

Europe for years and in the oil fields in this country.

For wells over 100 feet, this type of pump is very satisfactory and can be used in wells of any depth. However, the submergible should not be used in wells containing any sand.

The pump is very efficient and easily installed. Mumbaard says that farmers should remember that service facilities are very important. The pump cannot be repaired in the field and is usually sent back to the factory. Many dealers maintain a "loaner unit" which is installed while the customer's pump is being repaired.
