LONG-DISTANCE RATES
The Federal Communications Commission in a split decision, authorized a rate increase of 8 per cent for interstate long-distance telephone service of the Bell Telephone System, effective as of September 30 at midnight. The increase is expected to bring the system's gross income to \$55,000,000 and a net increase of \$35,000,000 in annual revenues.

FRENCH AID
In a joint statement, the United States and France announced a new plan to end the eight-year-old war in Indo-China. The United States will grant \$385,000,000 in additional aid to France and more French and native troops will be used there.

DEPORTEES
Deputy U. S. Attorney General William P. Rogers has reported that, in eight months since the Republican Administration took office, 578 alien criminals and subversives have been deported. Of the group, 42 were classed as subversives.
