Countians Await Nebraska Farm Bureau Meeting

An estimated 25 Cass county Farm Bureau members will be among the 500 expected to attend the four-day State Convention at Lincoln starting Sunday. Five delegates and five alternate delegates have been named to take in the sessions.

The convention opens Sunday afternoon with a Talent Find contest in which Miss Peggy Sand is scheduled to compete. Other Cass countians to take part in the program are Charles Marshall of Elmwood, state president, who will present his annual report Monday morning; and Paul Eveland, representative of the southeast district on the Resolution committee. The resolutions committee will meet Friday prior to the convention. Principal banquet speaker Tuesday night will be Hassil Schenck, president of the Indiana Farm Bureau since 1936. He has also been a member of the American Farm Bureau Board of Directors since 1937; and a member of the national organization's executive committee for eight years.

MANUFACTURERS' SALES

The Commerce Department reports that manufacturers' sales rose in September, but the rise was less than usual. Inventories held by manufacturers also made a slight rise, which was less than in recent months. During September manufacturers sold \$26,000,000,000 worth of products by comparison with \$25,500,000,000 in August, but, on a seasonally adjusted basis, September sales represented a 2 per cent decline from August. Inventories at the end of September were valued at \$45,000,000,000 — \$200,000,000 higher than at the end of August after seasonal adjustment.

ELECTRONIC MAIL SORTER

Some of the mail of the near future may be electronically sorted into piles for various destinations, according to postal officials, who say one device, developed by the Bureau of Standards, is "amazing" and may do much of the work now performed by 125,000 clerks. It requires the services of one operator scanning the mail. However, it will be several years before the machines can get into wide use.

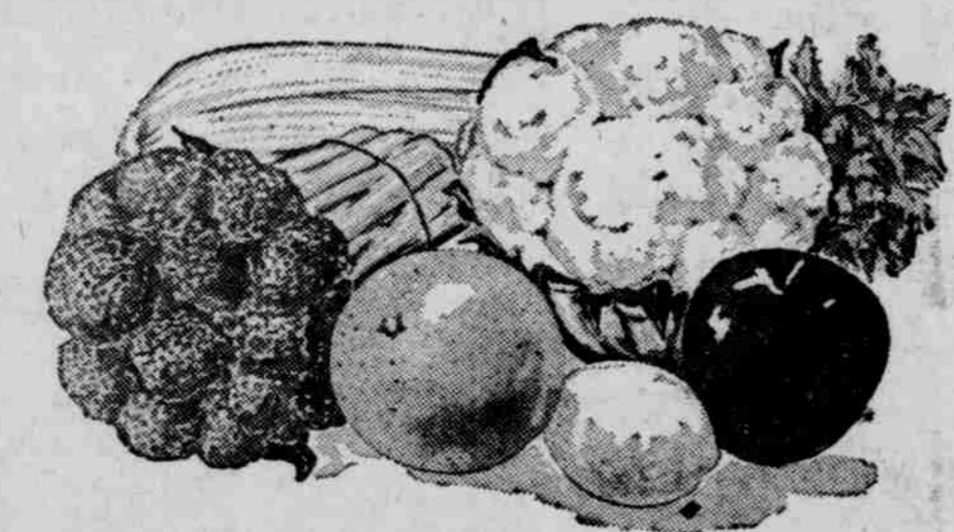

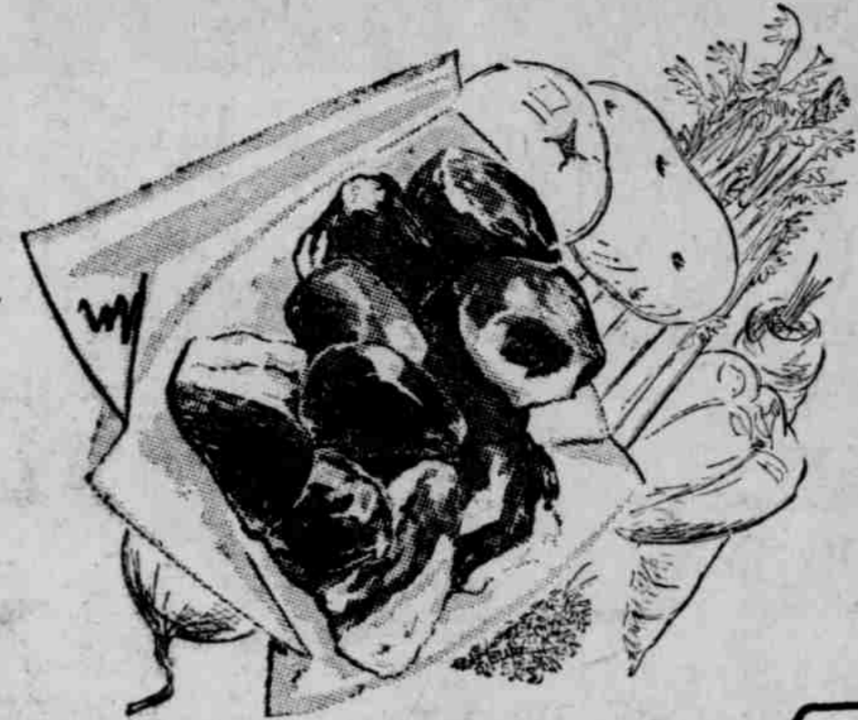
