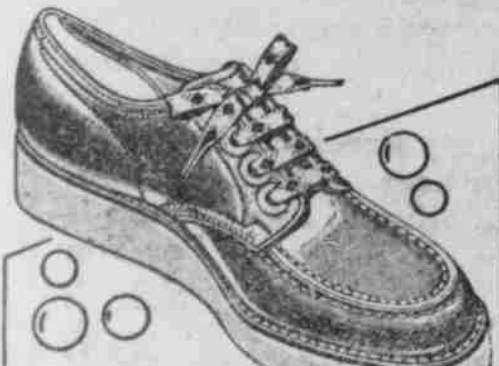

STRIKES DROP

The Bureau of Labor Statistics reported that labor management disputes resulted in about 50 per cent less idleness and involved only about half as many workers during September as during the preceding month. Work stoppages in September including those that started in prior months, totaled 600, affected 210,000 workers and caused a loss of 1,550,000 man-days. There were 675 strikes in August affecting 400,000 workers who were idle 2,800,000 man-days.
