

Final Rites for Harve Gregg Held Wednesday

Funeral services were held on Wednesday afternoon at the First Christian church for Harve Gregg, longtime resident of the Murray community who died last Sunday at an Omaha hospital.

The Rev. Val Johnson officiated at final rites at which Mrs. Hugh Stender Jr. was soloist and Mrs. Ferd Nolte, accompanist. Flower bearers were Mrs. Curtis Faris and Mrs. John Dietl.

Mr. Gregg, a Hebron, Indiana native had resided in the Murray community since 1884. Born March 22, 1882, the son of George and Lizzie Moore Gregg, he came to the Murray community with his parents at the age of two and resided in the community throughout the remainder of his lifetime. He was 71 years old.

Mr. Gregg worked in the Murray community as a carpenter

and builder. He was married in 1913 to Edna Shephardson at Nebraska City. She died at Murray in 1917.

Surviving are a brother, Roy Gregg of Murray; a sister, Mrs. Grace Chambers of Denver, Colorado; and several nieces and nephews in the Plattsmouth and Murray communities.
