

Use of Fertilizer Increasing In County, Rotarians Learn

Use of fertilizers on Cass county farms has grown considerably in recent years, Plattsmouth Rotary club members learned Tuesday noon at their regular weekly meeting.

The growth was outlined briefly by Clarence Schmadeke, Cass county extension agent, who was a guest of program chairman Richard Spangler.

Pointing out that fertilizers, in the commercial tone, are relatively new to Cass county and Nebraska, Schmadeke told local club members that since he came to the county in 1944 use of soil improvement fertilizers has grown to where it is now one of the most important activities in rural Cass county.

Schmadeke told the Rotarians that use of fertilizer in Nebraska is now about the same as it was in Illinois in 1940. In 1940 fertilizer used in Nebraska totaled 1,776,000 tons, while predictions are that it will hit 6,614,000 this year.

Schmadeke quoted crop production figures for 1952, a good agricultural year in the county, and explained that fertilizers will tend to increase those production figures even in years that are less favorable. In 1952 Cass county corn production averaged 41 1/2 bushels an acre, wheat 28 bushels, oats 14, barley 17, and alfalfa 23 tons.

Rotarians also learned that figures, such as 10-20-0 on sacks of fertilizers have definite meanings, outlining the content in each 100 pounds.

Use of fertilizers, the county agent said, is contingent upon accurate soil tests. In the past five years, an estimated 635 soil tests have been conducted in the county through the extension service. The tests tell the general fertilizers required, the amount necessary and other in-

formation such as when and how to apply fertilizer.

Schmadeke said the county is fortunate to have lime quarries from where lime for the soil can be obtained rather economically. But he also told of the importance of phosphate and potash in good soil management.

Rotarians also were informed of the way minerals, such as limes, phosphate and potash are lost from the soil, and how legumes are used to help restore fertility.

Most important, Schmadeke said, seems to be the farmer's desire to learn more of fertilizer properties and to make proper application.

Schmadeke explained that plans are being made to conduct a half-dozen demonstration farms this year in the county to determine actual fertilizer values. He explained that 1949 tests showed that application of phosphate increased wheat production 6 1/2 bushels an acre, nitrogen 2 1/2 bushels, and combination of the two 12 1/2 bushels on a sample tract between Weeping Water and Elmwood.

Rotarians also learned that next week's program will be on water health and sanitation. Dr. Paul T. Heineman will be program chairman.

Nola Keene, who was a patient at St. Mary's hospital for some time, suffering from a very severe case of Hepatitis and flu, was able to be brought home last Saturday.

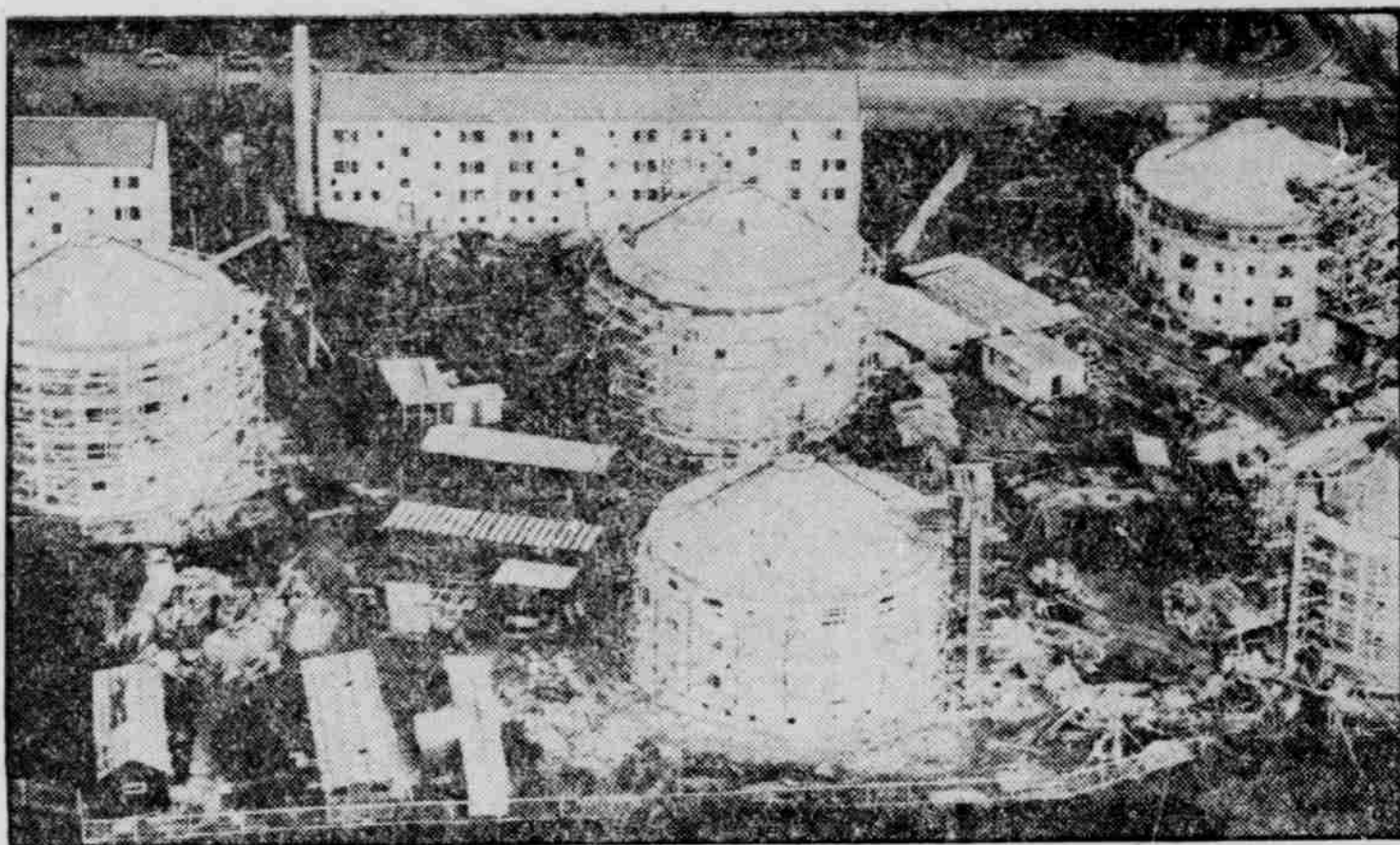
