Electric Cords Require Care, Extensioner Says

Electric repair shops often report that their biggest business is in repairing appliance cords.

Harriet Brigham, extension housing and equipment specialist at the University of Nebraska, tells us that its easy to keep these "lifelines" of electric appliances in good condition.

Many cord casualties result from the practice of pulling on the cord rather than the plug when disconnecting it. This eventually loosens the wire from the plug.

If there is a switch at the outlet, turn it off before you pull the plug, the specialist warns us. This prevents sparking between metal prongs and outlet, which damages metal and in time causes a poor connection.

If there's no switch, disconnect plug from wall outlet first. Grasp the plug and pull straight. If the plug sticks, rock gently from side to side as you pull to loosen one connection at a time. It's a good practice to disconnect cords from the outlet each time you finish using a heating appliance.

When cords are not in use, keep them in a clean, dry, cool place. Keep cords free from kinks and knots which can break fine wires or insulating covering.

Mechanical Gadgets Require Checking

When the electric power is cut off, the time clocks in the chicken houses need adjusting the same as the electric clock at the house says J. H. Claybaugh, extension poultry husbandryman, University of Nebraska.

If the power is interrupted for one hour, the time switch that normally turns the lights on at 4 a. m. will function at 5 a. m. For this reason, Claybaugh says, time clocks that control the lights in chicken houses require adjustments after each time power is interrupted if the chickens are to have regularity in the time of day they start to work.

This is another item that may require checking whenever some unusual reductions in feed consumption and egg production occurs.

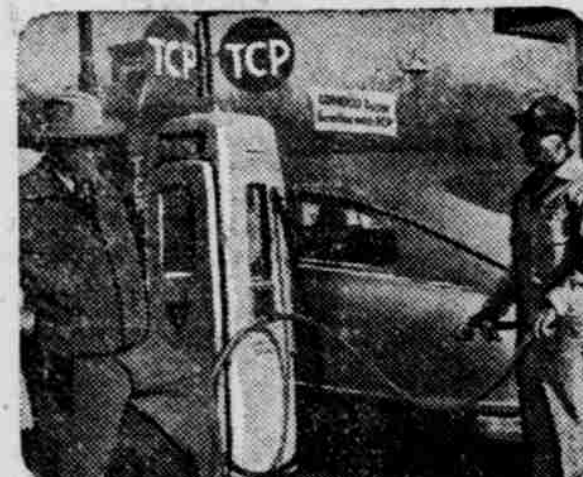
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
