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NOTICE OF AMENDMENTS OF ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION OF MANLEY COOPERATIVE GRAIN COMPANY
Notice is hereby given that there was a general meeting of stockholders of the Manley Cooperative Grain Company held at Plattsmouth, Nebraska, on February 28, 1954, at which more than a majority of the stockholders of said Corporation were present. At that meeting the Articles of Incorporation as theretofore existing were entirely reworked, repealed, and deleted in their entirety and the following

Amended and Substituted Articles of Incorporation of the Manley Cooperative Grain Company were adopted:

ARTICLE I
The name of this Corporation shall be The Manley Cooperative Grain Company.

ARTICLE II
The principal place of transacting the business of this Corporation shall be Plattsmouth, Cass County, Nebraska.

ARTICLE III
OBJECTS AND POWERS
The nature of the business of the Corporation, and the purpose for which it was formed, and its powers, are as follows:

(a) To engage in any activity in connection with the marketing, selling, harvesting, preserving, drying, processing, canning, packing, storing, handling, or utilization of any agricultural products produced or delivered to it by its members or others, or in connection with the purchase, hiring, or use by its members or others of supplies, machinery or equipment; or in the financing of any such activities, or in any one or more of the activities specified in this section.

(b) To direct, own, control, lease, or operate grain elevators, warehouses, storehouses, flour and feed mills, and to acquire property in any terminal market necessary in the business of the Corporation.

(c) To borrow money and to make advances to members.

(d) To act as the Agent or Representative of any member or members in any of the above mentioned activities.

(e) To purchase or otherwise acquire and to hold, own, and exercise all rights of ownership in and to sell, transfer, or pledge shares of capital stock or bonds of any Corporation or Association engaged in any related activity or in the handling or marketing of any of the products handled by the Corporation.

(f) To establish reserves and to invest the funds therein in bonds or such other property as may be provided in the By-Laws.

(g) To buy, hold, and exercise all privileges of ownership, over such real or personal property as may be necessary or convenient for the conduct and operation of any of the business of the Corporation or incidental thereof.

(h) To enter into all necessary and proper stipulations, agreements, and contracts and arrangements with any other Co-

operative Association or Association, formed in this or in any other State, for the cooperative and more economical carrying on of its business, of any part or parts thereof.

(i) To do each and everything necessary, suitable, or proper for the accomplishment of any one of the purposes or the attainment of any one or more of the objects herein enumerated or conducive to or expedient for the interest or benefit of the Association; and to contract accordingly; and in addition, to exercise and possess all powers, rights, and privileges necessary or incidental to the purposes for which the Corporation is organized or to the activities in which it is engaged, and in addition, any other rights, powers and privileges granted by the laws of this State to ordinary Corporations, except such as are inconsistent with the express provisions of this act, and to do any such thing anywhere.

The foregoing shall be construed both as Objects and Powers and the enumeration thereof shall not be held to limit or restrict in any manner the general powers conferred on this Corporation by the laws of the State of Nebraska, all of which are hereby expressly claimed.

ARTICLE IV
Section 1
The amount of the capital stock shall be Thirty Thousand dollars (\$30,000.00), divided into Three Hundred (300) shares of common stock, each of the par value of One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00).

Section 2
The Corporation is authorized to issue and sell to members and others, revolving fund certificates or credits of a character hereafter described, for the purpose of raising capital funds with which to engage in business, and in order to further the corporate legal effect as if the Corporation had first made cash payments of dividends on stock and/or distribution on a patronage basis to such patron, and thereafter, such patron had elected to use such cash to pay subscription, or to purchase certificates of the Corporation, as the case may be.

Funds arising from the issue of such certificates or credits, shall be used for creating a revolving fund for the purpose of building up such an amount of capital as may be deemed necessary by the Board of Directors from time to time and for revolving such capital. Such certificates or credits may contain such other terms and conditions not inconsistent herewith as may be prescribed from time to time by the Board of Directors of the Corporation. Such revolving fund certificates or credits shall be issued in annual series, each series being identified by the year in which it is issued, and each series shall be retired fully or on a pro-rata basis only at the discretion of the Board of Directors of the Corporation in the order of issuance by years as funds are available for that purpose. Such revolving fund certificates or credits may bear interest at the discretion of the Board of Directors but not to exceed Four per cent (4%) per annum thereon. A record of all holders of revolving fund certificates or credits shall be kept and maintained by the Corporation and such certificates shall be transferable only when approved by the Board of Directors, on the books of the Corporation, and no transfer of certificates shall be binding upon the Corporation unless so transferred. All other debts of the Corporation, both secured and unsecured, shall be entitled to priority over all outstanding revolving fund certificates or credits.

Section 3
The Corporation is authorized to issue to members and others building certificates for funds contributed as capital by members and others in cash. The funds so contributed as capital need not be segregated and may be used for the construction of facilities and for operating capital purposes. Such building certificates may contain such terms and conditions as are prescribed by the Board Directors. Interest may be paid on such certificates at not to exceed Four per cent (4%) per annum, whether or not interest is paid on other capital. Such interest shall however be non-cumulative. All debts of the Corporation, both secured and unsecured, shall be entitled to priority over all outstanding building certificates. Building certificates may be retired at the option of the Board of Directors either in whole or in part as determined by said Board. Interest shall stop on such certificates or part thereof after the same are called for retirement by the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE V
The termination of this Corporation shall be five years from December 22, 1934.

Jacques Leads Scoring Finnefrock Nips Wood for Second Spot; Nine Letter

ARTICLE VI

There shall be no limit to the amount of indebtedness to which this Corporation may subject itself.

ARTICLE VII
The business of this Corporation shall be conducted by a Board of Directors consisting of not more than nine persons to be elected by the stockholders from among their numbers, and the Directors shall elect a President, Vice-President, Secretary, and Treasurer, the President and Vice-President to be members of the Board. The officers and Directors shall be elected at such time and in such manner as shall be provided in the By-Laws adopted by the stockholders.

ARTICLE VIII
This Corporation shall hereafter operate as a cooperative corporation and is formed pursuant to provisions of Section 21-1301 to 21-1307 inclusive, R. S. Nebraska 1943, as amended.

Section 2
No person shall hereafter own more than Five per cent (5%) of the capital stock of the Company either directly or indirectly, nor unless he shall be a farmer, stockman, or landowner, shall he be eligible to share in crop rent, **PROVIDED**, that no owner of stock who shall hereafter become ineligible may, at the option of the Board of Directors, be permitted to continue in ownership of stock and receipt of dividends but shall be ineligible to vote at stockholders' meetings.

Section 3
Dividends on capital stock shall be fixed but shall not exceed Eight per cent (8%) per annum of the amount paid thereon.

Section 4
Each stockholder in the Corporation shall be limited to one vote per person at all stockholders' meetings regardless of ownership of revolving fund certificates and/or credits.

Section 5
(a) After provisions for reasonable reserves for depreciation, bad debts, contingent losses or expenses, the Company shall set aside to surplus fund not less than Five per cent (5%) of the earnings or savings after the payment of all expenses, dividends or interest in capital stock as provided in Article VIII, Section 3 hereof, until such surplus fund shall equal at least Twenty per cent (20%) of the capital stock paid together with additional capital derived from unpaid patronage dividends, building certificates and revolving fund certificates and/or credits. No additions to such surplus shall be made whenever it attains Fifty per cent (50%) of such total.

(b) The net earnings or savings of the Company remaining after making distribution of funds as provided in Sections Three (3) and Five (5) of this Article, shall be distributed on the basis of or in proportion to the amount or value of property bought or sold to members, or members and other patrons, or of labor performed, or other services rendered to the Corporation; **PROVIDED**, that this Section shall not prevent the Board of Directors from declaring patronage dividends at different rates upon different classes or kinds or varieties of goods handled; and **PROVIDED**, further, that the By-Laws of the Company shall give a detailed statement of the method to be followed in distributing the earnings or savings.

(c) Such net earnings or savings in an amount not exceeding Fifty per cent (50%) thereof may be paid as cash patronage dividends. All remaining net savings or earnings shall be allocated or credited to the account of each patron ratably in proportion to the business each patron had done with the Company during the fiscal year involved. Revolving fund certificates shall be issued for such deferred patronage refunds, or credits may be issued therefore as determined by the Board of Directors.

(d) Patronage dividends of subscribers who do not have one fully paid share may be applied upon the balance due on such share until it is fully paid.

(e) The Directors may issue nontransferable revolving fund certificates for deferred patronage dividends credited as provided in paragraphs (b) and (c) of this section, provided that such credits or certificates shall not mature until the dissolution or liquidation of the Corporation, but shall be callable by the Corporation at any time in the order of priority specified in

Jim Jacques was "head and shoulders" above his teammates in the scoring battle during the cage season just ended. The 6 foot 6 inch pivot who ended his cage play with Plattsmouth registered 246 points in 20 games, nearly 100 more than Byron Finnefrock, second place scorer.

Jacques jumped into an early lead in the scoring battle and led all departments, both field goals and free tosses. Finnefrock was in second place with 153 points, four more than Lyle Wood.

Jacques hit 88 field goals and 70 of 148 free tosses enroute to setting the scoring pace. Finnefrock meanwhile, had 56 field goals, the same as Lyle Wood, but had 41 of 85 free throws swish the net against 37 out of 83 Wood.

The free throw title went to Jon Schuetz, only regular to surpass the 50 percent mark. Schuetz converted 37 of 64 shots of 58 percent, well ahead of his nearest rival, Denny Ptak had 40 of 81 or 49 percent through the hoop, just a shade under the 50 percent mark. Larry Pierce with 4 for 7, Eugene Dasher with 7 for 9 and Jim Graves with 5 for 10 all hit the 50 percent mark or better, but had only one shot of the shots taken by Schuetz.

Stewart's starting quintet turned in 817 of the 959 points registered by the Devils in the 20 game season. In addition to the 246 by Jacques, Finnefrock had 153, Wood, 148, Schuetz, 135 and Denny Ptak 134. Stuart Nielsen wasn't far behind with 89 while Larry Pierce had 20 for the number seven spot.

Finnefrock, however, edged Wood and Jacques in the meaney department. The scrappy senior

Article IV Section 2 hereof.

Section 6
The Board of Directors shall have the power, by its By-Laws, to place limitations upon the ownership or transfer of shares of its stock whereby it may, in its discretion, and in accordance with the By-Laws, retire shares of stock, at par, whenever it seems to be in the best interest of the Corporation to do so.

Article IX
These Articles may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the stockholders present at a duly called meeting, **PROVIDED** there are not less than thirty-five per cent of the eligible stockholders present, and further, **PROVIDED** that notice shall first have been given to all stockholders by U. S. Mail both as to the time and place of the meeting and the substance of the subject matter to be covered.
