Let Cartoon Be Your Answer to Fire Siren

Let this cartoon be your answer during the coming weeks and months when you hear the fire siren or see the Plattsmouth Volunteer Fire Department trucks speeding toward a neighbor's home.

Fire Chief Sam Arn, joining with other civic leaders in the community, today added the voice of the Volunteer Fire Department in the cry for Clean Up week participation on a community-wide level. Arn offered a few suggestions to go along with Clean Up Week activities that may possibly prevent a disastrous fire.

While the city is offering pick up service for trash collected during clean up week, Arn offers this advice to those who decide to burn their own waste.

1. Never light an outdoor fire on a windy day.
2. Set out, and attach, your garden hose. Keep it handy until the fire is completely out.
3. Use a wire mesh basket or a metal container with a cover to burn in. Set it well away from any building, fence or tall grass.
4. Keep children away.
5. Stay with your fire until it is out and the ashes are cold enough to touch with the bare hands.

6. If, despite, all your precautions, your fire should threaten to get out of control, notify the Plattsmouth Volunteer Fire Department, Phone 17.
