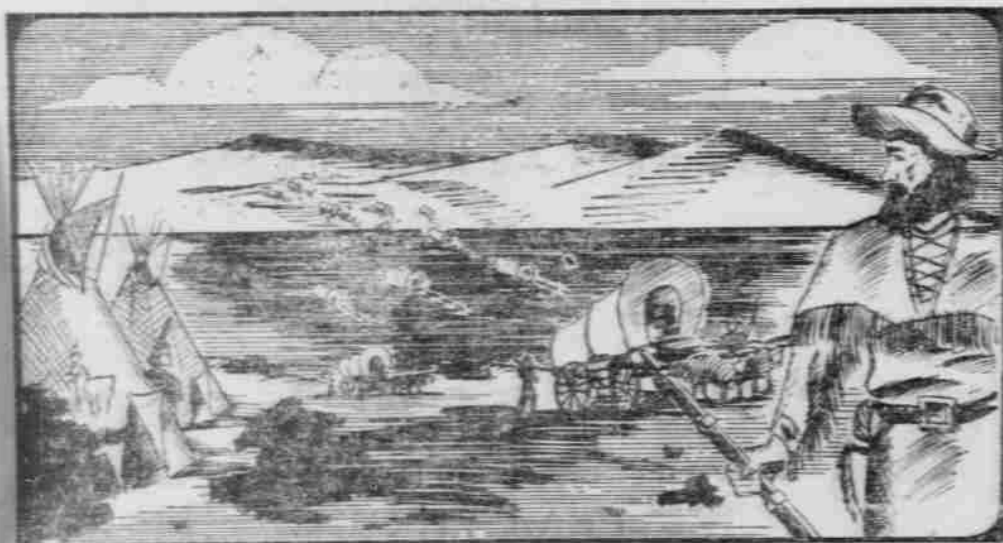
Albert Kunz is spending this week at Imperial looking after his farming interests and visiting relatives.
