

Louisville Lady Elected Tuberculosis Association Head

Mrs. La Rue Williams of Louisville has been elected president of the Cass County Tuberculosis and Health Association to succeed Mrs. Don Wurga of Plattsmouth.

She was elected at the annual meeting of the county association at Louisville.

Other officers elected were Mrs. Wayne Scoles, Union, first vice president; Mrs. Don Wurga, Plattsmouth, second vice president; Mrs. Anton Johnson of Louisville, secretary; Orville Nielsen, Plattsmouth, treasurer; Mrs. Scoles was elected representative director and Mrs. Williams, alternate.

Featured at the meeting also was a report of Mrs. Ken Weaver, county health director. Mrs. Weaver explained that 865 students in the county have been given tuberculosis tests and follow-up. Students in Murdock, Elmwood, Eagle and Alvo will be tested next week if dates can be arranged. A resident doctor from the University hospital in Omaha will conduct the tests.

Mrs. Weaver also expressed thanks of the association to doctors and health education chairman for the splendid cooperation during the testing period.

Miss Florence Miller and Miss Lillian Sorenson, field directors from Omaha, were present for the meeting. Miss Sorenson announced that Miss Miller is being transferred to another area and that Cass county will work with Miss Lela Miller, who will service the Southeast area.

During the meeting a report was also presented by Mrs. Charles Janacek of Plattsmouth, chairman of the Christmas seals, from which proceeds were obtained for the student tests. She explained that the high cost of conducting the tests will require greater seal sales next year.

Yearly reports were also given by all chairmen.

Earlier ladies of the Methodist church had served a 6:30 dinner to association directors from Union, Alvo, Elmwood, Louisville, Murdock and Plattsmouth.

Vocational Ag Program Set; Beck to Teach

Acceptance of the contract will mark the start of the vocational program at Plattsmouth. The program was recently adopted by the board of education, providing an instructor could be found.

Beck will come to Plattsmouth on July 1 to set up the program. He has been a vocational agriculture teacher for 3 1/2 years, the last two at Wisner.

At Wisner he has had outstanding success, and at the recent state Future Farmers Convention, his teams did remarkably well. He has had several FFA boys become state farmers in the program.

Beck was a state president of the Future Farmers and at the University was a member of the livestock judging team and a member of the Farm House fraternity. He was the recipient of several ag scholarships.
