

## Some Revamping Possible For Dual at Nebraska City

Comparison of meet times and distances for the two teams indicate that a close dual can be expected tonight. The meet, to be held at the Nebraska City oval, is scheduled for 6 p.m. Field events will be run off first before darkness sets in, with most track features being held under the lights.

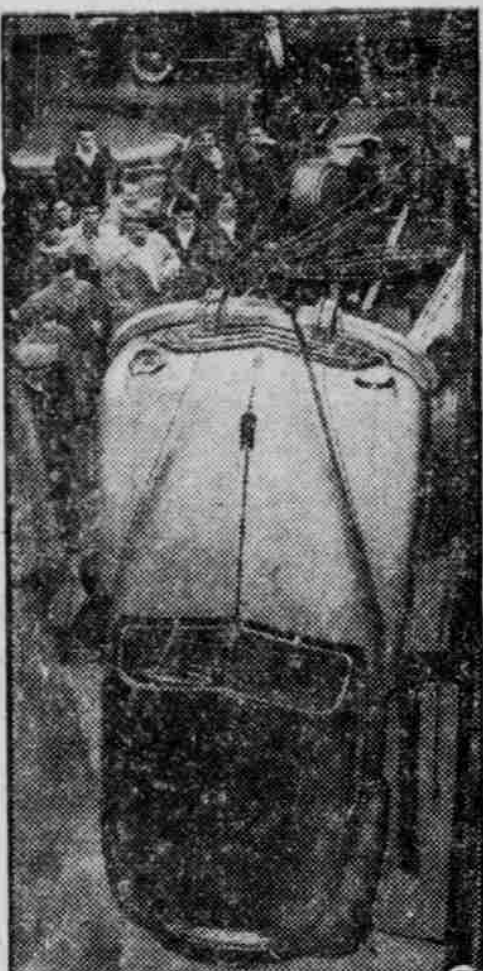

## Coach Stewart Resigns Post; Led Athletes Here 12 Years

Merle Stewart, high school athletic director, has resigned.

Stewart advised the board of education in a letter Friday, that he has resigned as head of the athletic department to ac-cept a position with a sporting goods firm.

His resignation will mean a complete change in the athletic staff at Platts-mouth during the coming school year. Earlier Gerald Clayburn and Eugene Shields declined to ink contracts for the coming year.

Completing his 12th year at Platts-mouth, Stewart directed the successful basketball cam-paign during the past year. He had moved up to athletic direc-tor at the start of the school year when coaches were assigned to head coaching jobs for the various sports.

Stewart came to Platts-mouth in 1942 and headed the athletic department throughout the pe-riod except for 1946 when he was in the service.

The Platts-mouth coach said the Stewart family will continue to reside at Platts-mouth while he is employed by the sporting goods firm.

Coach Ted Schiessler's Ne-hawka Indians dethroned Alvo at the 1954 Cass County Con-ference Track and Field meet staged on the Nebraska Wes-yan Oval last week.

Tom Johnson, all-around Ne-hawka athlete, paced the win-ers. Nehawka scored 51½ points to edge the defending Orioles who registered 45¼.

Corn Cobs activities include selling year books, and attending games and rallies throughout the football season. New mem-bers are voted into the club on the basis of their work during the previous two semesters.

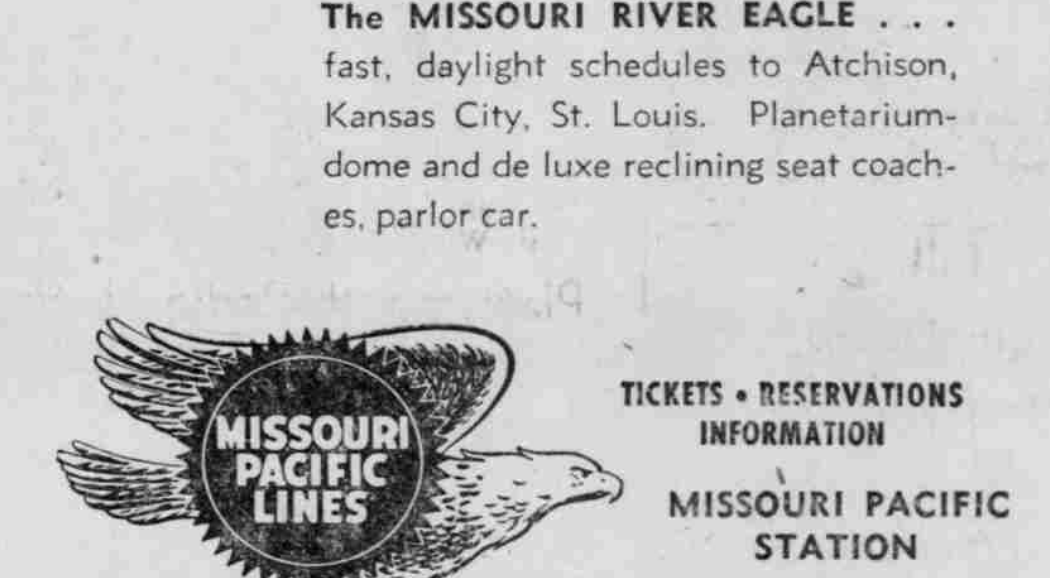

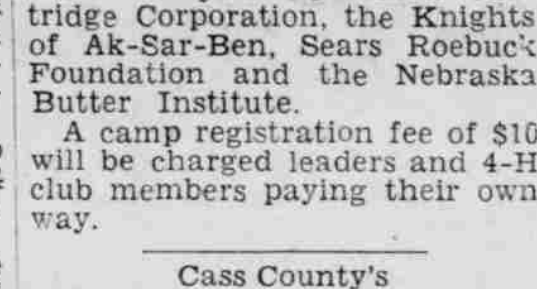
While Bryant was losing three Catalytic climbed into a third place tie by sweeping its se-ries from Eagles Lodge. The two teams are knotted with records of 51-36.
