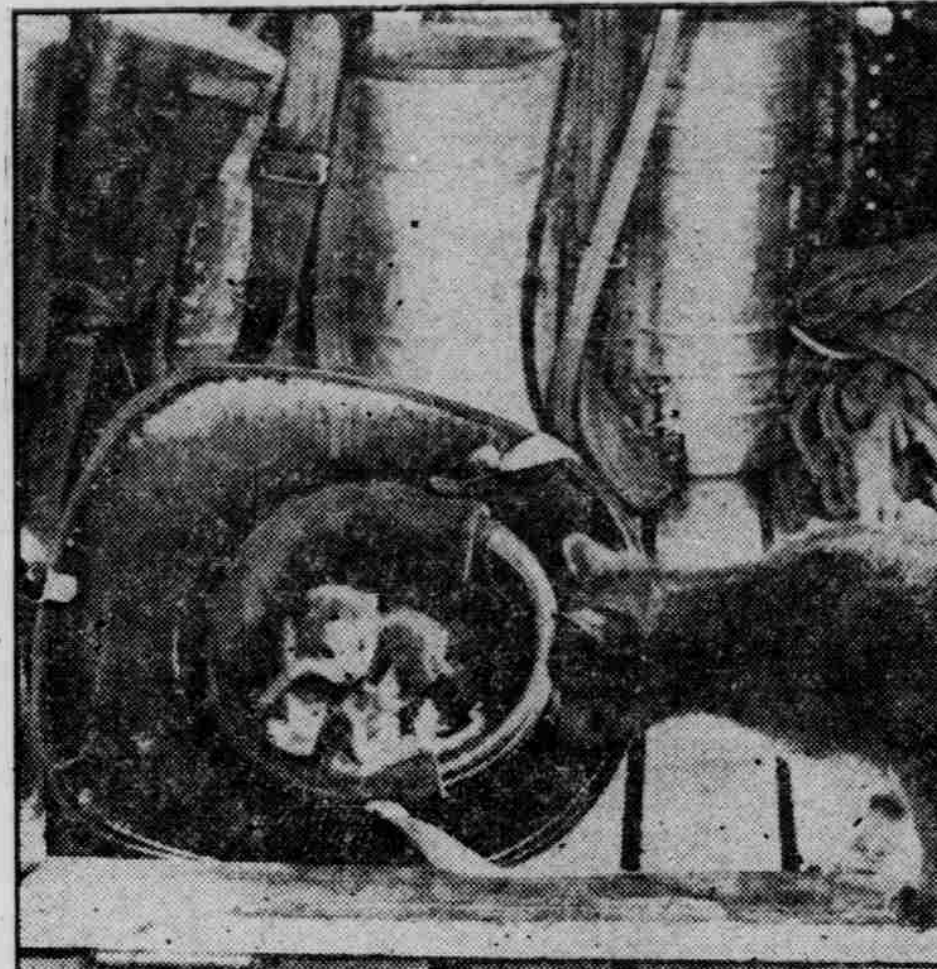

JUDGE RETIREMENT
Under the terms of a proposed constitutional amendment, passed by the Senate, all Federal

judges would be forced to retire when they reach the age of 75. Besides the mandatory retirement provision, the proposal would fix the size of the Supreme Court at nine justices, thus preventing any future attempt to enlarge or cut the highest tribunal. Since it may be years before there is final action, presumably few, if any of the present Federal judges, would be affected.
